OVERFLOW CULMINATES IN A MURDER

The End of an Ontario Feud—Child Shot and Another Wounded in the Arm By a Mob

PETERBORO, ONT., Aug. 25.—(Special)—A mob of men last night broke into the house of Robert Holt, a farmer living about twenty miles from here and shot and killed Thomas Edward, the twelve year old son and also his sister Mabel, age fifteen, through the wrist.

The murder is culminative of a feud existing in the neighborhood for some years during which barns have been burned and cattle poisoned.

The eighth Semi-Annual S. S. Convention of South East Prince district, was held in the Victoria Methodist church, which was beautifully decorated for the occasion on Wednesday Aug. 16th. Both sessions were very well attended. In the afternoon the social service was led by Thos. Moyle. The minutes were then read and adopted. Roll of schools was then called and ten of them sent delegates out of fourteen in the district. Mr. Robertson gave a very interesting account of many things he found helpful to his school, after which the Field Secretary gave a blackboard lesson on some of our difficulties. It was very instructive containing many helpful ideas which should be carried to the home and school. Rev. Thos. Stebbings read an excellent paper on "Head and Heart Training" showing how it develops into character. As this is the most essential thing in Sunday School work, a right character is very influential in the different spheres of life and a great promotion to the cause of God. Various are the lessons we have in regard to the great effect of a pure character for which we are thankful—and ever keeping in mind the great example of Him who lived and died for us. In the evening the Field Secretary gave another blackboard lesson. First going back to the start of the Sunday School and its development, the necessity of teaching in the school, its vital importance as it is an organization of Christ; its aim is to instruct the children in the word of God as it is the formation of character, then they eventually become transformed till they grow into the likeness of Christ himself. The report of finances was read and adopted. Mr. Moyle followed the report by an excellent solo. The Field Secretary then gave a short address on putting life in the lesson which was very attentively listened to as it showed what is necessary in order to become a successful teacher. After a vote of thanks being conveyed to the good friends of Victoria for their kindness and generous hospitality which cannot be surpassed, the convention closed by benediction.—Hermas Myers, Secretary and Treasurer.
