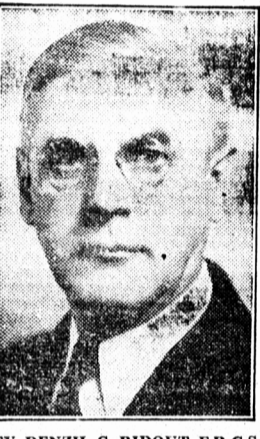
Minutes of previous meeting were read, approved and signed.

Warm Tributes To Former Island Pastor

Eloquent tributes to the late Very Rev. Thomas E. Cullen, Ph. D., Minneapolis, formerly of this Province, appear in the October 5 issue of The Catholic Bulletin, St. Paul, Minnesota, on the occasion of the funeral services in the Church of St. Stephen.

"Men and women wept unashamedly" the Bulletin says, "when Father Cullen, first citizen of Minneapolis, college president, civic leader, brilliant speaker, but by choice and above all a pastor of souls" Thousands visited the bier as it lay in state in the church from Tuesday, Oct. 1, until the funeral on Thursday, Oct. 4. He held the diocese pontificated at the Solemn Requiem Mass, the sermon being preached by the Very Rev. James M. Reardon, a life long friend of Father Cullen and a brother of Mr. J. W. Reardon, Charlottetown. Other old friends from Prince Edward Island, Rev. James Donahoe of St. Bridget's Church, and the Rev. John P. Foley of Fairbairn, were deacon and altar servers.

In his obituary announcement, the Catholic Bulletin says:

"Father Cullen was born at Charlottetown, P.E.I., on September 20, 1874, the son of Patrick and Mary Campbell Cullen. He studied first at St. Patrick's school and a serious minded boy at the age of 14, he then entered the Prince of Wales College, Hard work and study engaged his hours day and night from his earliest years. He held the teaching diploma at the age of 16 and began that career in Souris. He was back at St. Patrick's school as principal when only 19 years old. He had no time for games or sports and his life was austere.

"In the fall of 1897 the ambitious youth enrolled at the Catholic University of Ottawa. It was there that he first became active in the social abstinence movement. He returned home fired with a zeal cultivated by the writings of Archbishop John Ireland. His advocacy of temperance brought him into touch with Archbishop Ireland and as a consequence he was invited to come to St. Paul where the total abstinence movement was then well advanced.

Father Cullen arrived in St. Paul in September, 1898, and began studying for the priesthood. He was ordained Nov. 8, 1901 by the late Bishop James McGlockie of Duluth, his first appointment being as an assistant at the St. Paul Cathedral. His subsequent career, which included the building of the Pro-Cathedral of St. Mary, in service as President of the College of St. Thomas, is reviewed in detail in the Catholic Bulletin, which also publishes the text of Father Reardon's sermon, from which the following concluding passages are quoted:

"Day and night he (Father Cullen) has been at the beck and call of the people—at the altar, in the pulpit, in the confessional, in the school, in the hospital at the round table, at home and abroad—and everywhere about his Father's business. Tirelessly he labored, unselfishly he wrought for the people's good. His vigilance never relaxed. There was no surcease from toil. He continued to do the work of an

evangelist, to fulfil his ministry to the last. No duty was better known in the city, none more highly respected, none more closely listened to than he. He died in harness as he wished. He said Mass and preached here last Sunday and declared that he was untroubled to die.

"The night has come at last when no man can work, the active brain is at rest, the throbbing heart is pulsing, the tick of a shepherds' life has gone into the house of eternity, neither we cannot follow him, for our hour has not yet struck. His bereaved people will not soon forget him in their prayers and Masses, nor the brother priests beside whom he labored for two score years, and whom he edified by a life of priestly rectitude."

FOUR "WITNESSES" ACQUITTED

ALFRED, Me., Oct. 21—(AP)—Four of five members of Jehovah's Witnesses, a religious sect, accused of assaulting Dudley Robinson, 25, with intent to kill at Kennebunk last June were acquitted today by order of Superior Judge Edward P. Murray. Robinson suffered gunshot wounds.

The fifth defendant, Edwin S. Robb of Kennebunk must await a jury's verdict tomorrow. A defence motion for a directed verdict in Robb's favor was overruled.

Those freed were Joseph W. Leathers, Portland and Kennebunk; Benjamin Graves, Kennebunk; Richard Trask and Pavette Snowdale, both of Bideford.
