Place Names Of Prince Edward Island

Gain; creek, lot 11. Gains creek in Meacham, 1880, which shows Philip Gain, settler here.

Gairloch; settlement, lot 60. Meacham, 1880, which gives Selkirk Road as the post office name. The latter is the only name on Wright and Cundall, 1874. Now Gairloch, but still called Gairloch by the old people. Gairloch is a parish in Ross-shire, Scotland.

Galloway; point, lot 50. Orwell point of Holland, 1765. The origin of the name Galloway is obscure. In April, 1831, the legislature was petitioned for a grant for a road "from Cherry Valley to Galloway point." In February, 1833, the legislature was asked for a grant to complete the road "from Orwell point to Cherry Valley." The history of the island furnishes no reason why anyone should have been hanged at this out-of-way place. The majority of island names are personal ones and probably are a swag in a corruption of some such family name as Galland, Gallo, Gallet (de la Roque, 1752) or Gillis. A John Gillis was one of the Selkirk settlers on the "Polly" and built a small church near the landing place in Belfast cove, lot 57 inside the corner of the road for all east side of Belfast creek next to the old French burial ground. In 1806 Gillies purchased 200 acres from the Earl of Selkirk at the bottom of the cove in Orwell bay. The map history of the name is as follows: Galloway, chart, 1846; Gall, Cundall, 1851; Gallows, Wright, 1852; Gallo, Lake, 1863; Gallas, Wright and Cundall, 1874; Gallas, Meacham atlas, 1880. The first reference to Gallas point is in a volume entitled "The Progress and Prospect of P. E. I.," published by Bagster at Charlottetown in 1801. Meak is the Micmac name.

Gambles Corner; settlement, lot 28. A post office July 1, 1896, to December 15, 1913. The name commemorates a resident. Lady Fame school is here.

Garfield; settlement, lot 58. Probably after James Abraham Garfield, 20th president of the United States. Named about 1881. Earlier Gairloch, which see.

Gascogne; cove, lot 60. Holland, 1765. After Bamber Gascogne (1725-91), Lord Commissioner of Trade and Plantations, 1763-1779. Misspellings: Gascogne, on later maps. Tulospokee is the Micmac name. Bamber Gascogne was the eldest son of Sir Crisp Gascogne (1709-1761), lord mayor of London. He entered Queen's College, Oxford (1743); was barrister of Lincoln's Inn (1750); was M. P. for Malton, 1763; Midhurst, 1765-70; Weoboly 1770-84; Truro 1774-84 and 1784, and Bossiney was also receiver general of customs and lord of the Admiralty. His son's daughter married the 2nd Marquis of Lansdowne, who took the name of Gascogne, and National Biography.

Gaspareaux; pond, lot 63. Wright and Cundall, 1874. The Micmac name is Ujukaskooch, meaning "little pond."

Gaspareaux; settlement, lot 61. After the fish caught here—gasparan in French, alowife in English. Name in use 1830. Gaspareau in Macgregor map, 1832.

Gass; brook, lot 30. Meacham, 1880, which shows Wm. Gass settler.

Gaudin; point. Georgetown. Name in Bayfield, "Sailing Directions" 1847 and on chart, 1850. A Jersey name.

George; island, Malpeque bay. Holland, 1765. After Lord George Lennox. Refer to Richmond.

George; river, lot 10.

George; point, Charlottetown. Chart, 1846.

Georgetown; town Kings county. Holland, 1765. After George III (1738-1820), succeeded to the throne 1760. Incorporated as a town 1912.

Gilbert; point, lot 24. Gilberts point, Meacham, 1880.

Gillis; point, lot 13. Census, 1798, mentions Roderick Gillis, from Barra, Scotland, as head of a family in this lot. Gillis on chart, 1850.

Spelled Gillies on recent aditus and Department of Interior map, 1914. Also known as Low point. Abraham Gesner, in his report on the geology of the island dated December 31, 1846, says: "Near the Point is the site of an old French village and a large chapel which was abandoned... when the Acadians were expelled. It is now covered with a thick growth of fir and spruce. At this place also the sea has advanced rapidly upon the shore and has intruded upon the ancient cemetery.... I collected all the bones I could find in the graveyard and by the aid of the Indians, who considered it a very unpleasant task they were reinterring some distance from the shore. This place has been a favourite spot for money diggers. If the persons who have dug large pits at the Low Point would endeavor to replace the bones of their race in a place of security their labours would be more praiseworthy than now are in fruitless searchings for the gold of the pirate, Captain Kidd who probably never visited the island."

Gladstone; settlement, lot 64. A post office, May 1, 1907, to October 1, 1915. May be after Rt. Hon. W. E. Gladstone (1809-1898), British statesman.

Glasbein; settlement, lot 58. Glassvinn on Lake, 1868. Glasbein on Wright and Cundall, 1874; Glasvinn road in Meacham, 1880. After Glasbein, Skye, Scotland. Gaelic for "gray mount."

Glenaladale; settlement, lot 36. After Glenaladale, Invernesshire, Scotland. Refer to Scotch Fort.

Glencoe; railway station lot 50.

Glencorradale; settlement, lot 46. An Invernesshire settlement. After a place in Skye.

Glenfanning; settlement, lot 53. Meacham, 1880.

Glenfinglas; settlement, lot 30. Lake, 1863.

Glenfinnan; settlement, pond, river and island, lot 35. After Glenfin-

and Glenaladale, in Scotland, bought out some 200 emigrants to Prince Edward Island. Glenfinnan was the name of his ancestral estate and the old home of many of the emigrants, in 1745, when Prince Charles made his attempt to regain the throne, the Stewart standard was first raised on the Glenfinnan estate of Alex Macdonald. John's father, The name of the old home was adopted for the new. Refer to Scotchfort. Charts misspell Glen Finnon. The island is Ile aux Chevres (Goat island) of Franquet, 1751. McNally island is another alternative name, after a settler on it.

Glenforest; settlement, lot 62. A post office, Glen Forest, September 1, 1911, to July 1, 1918.

Glenferry; settlement, lot 7. Originally school district name given by Alex. McDonald, who came from Glenferry, Invernesshire, Scotland, Meacham, 1880.

Glenny; school district, lot 36. Lake, 1863.

Glenmartin; settlement, lot 61. Named, 1894, after John Martin, oldest living settler.

Glenvalley; school district, lot 67.

Glenwilliam; settlement, lot 63. After Wm. Matheson, farmer; immigrated from Skye about 1862; died 1865.

Glennywood; settlement, lot 8. A post office, November 1, 1904, to February 1, 1914.

Glynde River; settlement, lot 21. A post office April 1, 1910, to January 15, 1914.

Goodwood; river, lot 12. Refer to Goodford.

Goose; creek, lot 65. Chart, 1846. Wild geese formerly restored here. A few are still shot at the creek.

Goose; pond, Ellis river, lot 14. Chart, 1850.

Goose; river, lot 42. A very small stream. Also Goose River settlement.

Goose; river, lot 16.

Goosencok; a long strip of dry sand forming one side of Georgetown harbour. Holland, 1765.

Gordon; creek, Foxley river, lot 6. Chart, 1851. Sarah's pond on Hill may, 1821.

Gordon; cove and point, lot 27. Holland, 1765. May be after Lt. Col. Gordon Graham (refer to Graham) or Capt. Wm. Augustus Gordon, who fought at Louisbourg and Quebec, grandfather of General Gordon of Khartoum.

Gordon; point, Brudenell river, lot 53. Chart, 1850.

Government; island and shoals, Hillsborough bay. Governors island on Holland, 1765. Translation of the original French name Ile Gouverneur, which on Franquet, 1751. Refer to St. Peter island. The Micmac Indian name is Okosik, meaning "the place where goods are landed."

Gowanbar; settlement, lot 43. Meacham, 1880. Evidently named from the mountain daisy, Scottish "gowan."

Graham; head, lot 26. Holland, 1765. Possibly after Lt. Col. Gordon Graham, who received half lot 47. Hon. George Grenville (1712-70);

Gretna Green; settlement, lot 67. Lake, 1863.

Grigg; creek, lot 12. Griggs creek in Meacham, 1880, which shows Wm. Grigg, settler.

Grover; island, Malpeque bay. Holland, 1765. Known locally as Ram Island.

Guerite (pointe de la); point, north of Aleshorn point, lot 65. French name on Franquet, 1751, meaning watch-tower point.
