MAJOR ACCIDENT IN COAL MINE - WELCH, W. Va., Jan. 16 - (AP) - Three men were killed and another died subsequently in hospital while more than 200 escaped from a major accident, recorded in the history of coal mining in West Virginia.

Twenty-two other men working deep inside the Havaco No. 9 mine of the New River Coalfields Company were killed in an explosion which was so great that it wrecked buildings in the immediate area.

Five of the 22 injured were discharged after treatment and returned to the mouth of the wrecked mine. Company officials reported 287 men were at work when the deep mine first warned that a blast had occurred.

The strange aspect of the explosion was that with so many in the blast area, so few were killed. In most catastrophes of this kind, seldom do more than a few of the trapped come out unscathed.

Within an hour after the blast, the first survivors walked out unscathed up an emergency stairway which somehow remained intact although the "head house" of the mine and the tipple were destroyed.

Some of the more seriously injured were hoisted out by an improvised cable and bucket arrangement through an air shaft.

E. L. Chaffler, inspector-in-charge of the State Mines Department, indicated searchers did not expect to find any more dead in the mine.

Rescue workers with Chaffler in charge, entered the workings through the usual gas mask. The inspector explained that the air below was unusually good.

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Continue Search For Body Of Drowned Newport Resident

Not discouraged with their failure to recover the body of John Moran, 36-year-old mail driver, who was drowned near Bridgeport, King's County on Tuesday afternoon, Jan. 16, the residents of the surrounding district are still hopeful that their persistent efforts will meet with success.

The recent sub-zero weather had added three or four inches to the ice covering Grand River so that hopes in quest of the body are obliged to cut through eight or nine inches in order to let the grapnel and other dragging apparatus down. The work of a laborious nature since so many holes have to be cut.

Some of the searchers have concluded that the rubber boots and leathers coat which the late Mr. Moran is known to have been wearing at the time of his death, should be preserved as a memento of the body by allowing the straps to slip over their smooth surfaces. The searchers are still busy making extra long wooden handles for the grapnel and other apparatus in the hope they may recover the body by this means.

The body of the son, Emmett, was recovered last night from where the car had plunged both father and son to their deaths. It was near that spot which is about 300 yards off Matthew and MacNeil streets at Bridgeport, where Emmett's body was found and many of the searchers are convinced the body of the father lies somewhere near.

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1945 A Big Year In Scientific Research

OTTAWA, Jan. 4 - (CP) - Developments in the use of atomic energy and radar, the design and construction of a plywood tailless aircraft, and the developments in new uses for wheat highlighted the new Canadian scientific achievements of 1945, the National Research Council reported today.

In a preliminary report on work done by it last year, the council told how Canadian scientists had co-operated in the development of the atomic bomb.

Work on the bomb had led to the design of a pilot plant for the production of atomic materials and that plant now was under construction at Chalk River, Ont., 130 miles northwest of Ottawa.

A branch of the National Research Council has established there in association with the pilot plant to carry out research on the application of atomic energy in war and in industry and on the use of its products in research and medicine," said the report.
