CANADA SOLD \$5,000,000 OF NICKEL LAST YEAR.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—Figures just published by the Trade and Commerce Department show that Canada's exports of nickel for the twelve months ending with November last amounted to \$5,218,822.
