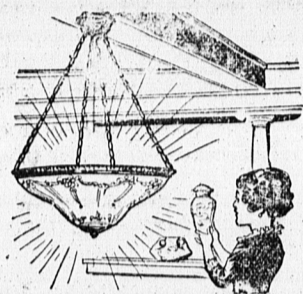

He was very badly injured, a spike entering his shoulder, his collar bone being splintered, several ribs fractured and a bone in his arm being put out of place. His condition last evening was very critical.

Board of Trade
At a council meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade on Tuesday evening communications were read from Messrs J. E. Sinclair, D. Nicholson and W. L. McKenzie King M. P.'s relative to the Memorial on Transportation. Regarding the proposed second Car Ferry Steamer, one speaker said in part: "It is now being considered feasible to build a second car ferry ice-breaker steamer with proper salvage and wrecking apparatus so that she might serve the needs of Prince Edward Island as a second Car Ferry during the rush seasons, and be available to render any assistance to any steamer or craft in distress in or about the Gulf of St. Lawrence or eastern coast on quick notice."

A request from the Atlantic Leader, Halifax, for a series of pictures to be used in their illustrated section was received, and the Secretary was instructed to secure same.
Letters from the Falk American Potato Flour Corporation were read. This company advised that they have not decided against locating here, but have had to withhold their decision awaiting the return of their experts from Europe.
Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh, Chairman of committee on Telephones, read the committee's report which was well received, and Secretary W. L. Higgins was asked to forward a copy of the same to the Premier for his consideration.
On motion a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Tidmarsh and the other members of the committee for the very excellent report they had prepared. Mr. Tidmarsh made a very suitable reply.
Messrs E. T. Higgs, M. P. P. and W. F. Tidmarsh were appointed delegates to represent the board at the Ninth Congress of Chambers of Commerce of the British Empire, which is to be held in Toronto, Sept. 14, 15, 16 and 17th.
A number of matters of minor importance were discussed after which the Council adjourned. President Isaac Carter presided.

EVERYTHING TAXED IN U. S.—A gentleman in the city from Boston says that at present sugar is at a premium in the Bean City. Dealers are allowed to sell only a single pound to each customer under heavy penalty and housewives resist to many subtleties to defeat the law, whereby they may purchase more than their allowance. Every conceivable article is taxed, even down to the ice cream and summer drinks, which one purchases and partakes of at the counter. Canada is Elysium as compared to the States just now in this regard," said the speaker.
