SUBJECTS TO BE DISCUSSED BY CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE CONGRESS

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association has the Largest List of Resolutions to be Threshed out at Meeting in Montreal in August.

OTTAWA, May 13.—Lord Strathcona has forwarded to the department of trade and commerce copies of resolutions which Canadian institutions propose presenting to the Congress of the Chambers of Commerce of the empire, in Montreal in August next.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association figures prominently in the list. They recommend that British capital and emigration should be directed to the colonies rather than to foreign countries. That a reciprocity league be established whereby all British ports, all British goods be admitted at lower rates than to foreign and that a preference be granted to the empire when instituting a tariff in South Africa; that British treaties with foreign countries should always leave Britain free to enter into expedient trade relations with the colonies; that the imperial postage system apply on all printed matter and parcels as well as letters, and all British news service; obnoxious contribution to imperial defence, the establishment of intercolonial commercial councils, preference to British subjects on all imperial public works, the appointment of an imperial commission to visit all parts of the empire and report on the resources and how they may best serve the interests of the whole.

The Paris (British) Chamber of Commerce offers a resolution approving of the resolution passed at the last imperial congress meeting to the effect that the British government should take immediate steps in conjunction with the colonies, to obtain for British colonies, the most favored nation treatment from those countries which have granted a most favored nation treatment to the United Kingdom and against which the colonies are now discriminating in their customs tariff.

CARDINAL VAUGHAN DYING

LONDON, May 13.—The question of Cardinal Vaughan's successor as the head of the English Roman Catholic Church is much discussed. The Bishop of Southwark is the probable successor. Cardinal Vaughan's condition has been so serious that he received the last sacrament before St. Joseph's Day, saying devoutly to a friend: "I am now ready packed, and wish to go."

The Birmingham Chamber of Commerce advocates the adoption of cheap postage between the different parts of the empire on all newspapers and periodicals published therein.

The Paris (British) Chamber of Commerce advocates that the French customs should treat goods, on through bill of lading from a British colony as coming direct and free of the surtax imposed in addition to regular customs duty on goods entering at outside European ports.

The Toronto Board of Trade proposes a resolution for the adoption of a commercial policy based on the principle of mutual benefit to each component part of the empire. They also advocate the appointment of a joint committee to draw up a scheme along these lines.

ALBERTON AND VICINITY

Rev. J. G. Shearer, Secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada, visited Alberton on Wednesday, 13th inst., in the interests of the Alliance. Two meetings were held. The afternoon meeting was chiefly devoted to business matters relating to organization methods of work legislation and enforcement of Sunday law. The evening meeting which was held in the Presbyterian Church was opened with devotional exercises conducted by Rev. H. G. Gratz, who presided on both occasions. After a few suitable words of introduction by the Chairman, Mr. Shearer then came forward and addressed the congregation. In a strong, stirring and deeply impressive speech, he presented the case for the maintenance and preservation of the Lord's Day, showing clearly that in the battle for the Sabbath three great issues are involved, viz. our national well-being, the industrial liberty of the masses, and the progress and life of the church. He pointed out that the chief enemies we had to contend with in the struggle are irreligion, immorality greed whose motto has always been "The Sabbath was made for money-making," and selfishness which disregards the rights and welfare of others. "Yet they that be with us are more than they that be with them." God was on our side. The mighty organization of the church was united in a grand federation for the preservation of the Sabbath as a day of rest. The working men were also leagued together, and ever-prepared to unite with the Alliance for the same purpose.

In closing Mr. Shearer strongly emphasized the fact of individual responsibility and in the name of liberty, patriotism and religion urged upon all the need and the duty of co-operating with the Alliance in defence of the sacred institution of the Sabbath.

On motion it was unanimously decided to organize a branch of the Alliance to be known as West Prince Branch of the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada.

A short meeting of the executive was then held and Hon. B. Rogers and Rev. A. D. McDonald were appointed delegates to attend the meeting of the Alliance to be held in Charlottetown next Monday, 18th inst.
