Taffy Apples

2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon elder vinegar, 1 cup water, A few grains salt. Boil together until it cracks when dropped in cold water.

Apple Faces

Red or yellow apples may be used. Insert cloves to represent eyes, a blanched almond for a nose, and cut a slit for the mouth.

Steamed Apples

Remove skin carefully. The red blush will remain on the apple. Serve cold with cream, plain or whipped.

Apple Cups

Cut a slice from the stem end of red apples. Scoop out centre with a teaspoon. Cook plump to sauce consistency, adding a little water if necessary.
