THERE passed peacefully away at Hazelbrook on July 25th, Jennie A. beloved daughter of Mrs. Mary Wood, aged 24 years, leaving to mourn a mother residing at Hazelbrook, and a brother Wesley, cheesemaker at Summerside. The Guardian in common with many friends extends sympathy to Mrs. Wood in the hour of her sore bereavement.

There follows are particulars of the death of Mrs. William A. Cameron, Stellarton, mother of Mrs. W. A. Windfield, city. Inexpressibly distressing and startlingly sudden was the news that rapidly spread all over the country that Mrs. Wm. Cameron of Stellarton was found dead on Wednesday evening. Mr. Cameron, who is principal owner and manager of the Sylvester Brick Works, has a summer cottage alongside the works where during the summer months the family resides. On Wednesday Mr. and Mrs. Cameron took dinner together as usual. Mrs. Cameron was hearty and bright and happy. Mr. Cameron then went to the brick works to attend to his usual duties. On coming home to his tea between five and six he found the fire had not been kindled, the table was not set and there were no preparations for the evening meal. He called out but got no response. After looking around the house he went down to the shore on a few yards away to the spot where Mrs. Cameron was accustomed daily to bathe. Here to his intense distress he was horrified to find the body of his wife face downwards on the shore. She had her bathing suit on and Mr. Cameron thinking that perhaps she had been drowned, started to try and resuscitate her. He worked eagerly and long and hard, but alas, there was no life there. A messenger was immediately despatched to Westville for a doctor, who, on arriving pronounced the cause of death as apoplexy, death being instantaneous. The remains were then taken to her home, which only two short months ago, was the happy scene of her only daughter May's wedding. The late Mrs. Cameron was in every respect a very superior woman—well educated, refined, intelligent, a great reader, a splendid conversationalist, kind and generous; her hospitality was unbounded and every one who came within the sphere of her acquaintance was charmed and delighted. In every sense she was a good woman. Her maiden name was Elizabeth Somerville, and she belonged to Edinburgh, Scotland. She was 56 years of age and married Mr. Cameron about 25 years ago. She leaves a husband, one son and one daughter, Mrs. Windfield, two sisters and a brother living at Edinburgh, also survive her.

Birney, Honorary President of the National Congress of Mothers, discussing "The Choice of Occupation," in the September Delineator. 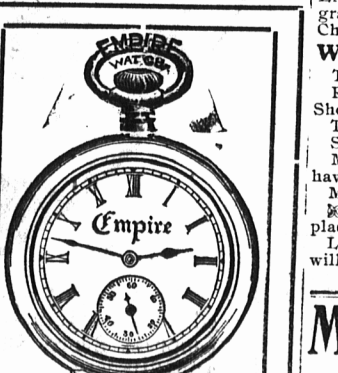
