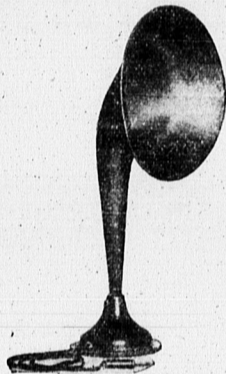
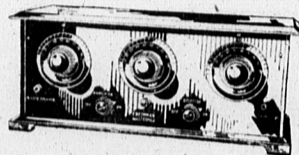

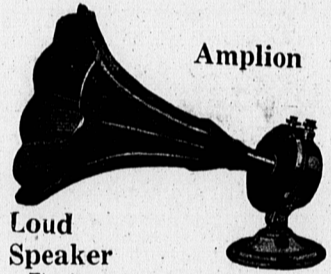

## CAN'T CURE CANCER WITHOUT SURGERY

PARIS, Oct. 27.—Legal proceedings against a medical institute which professes to cure cancer without surgery have begun by Justin Godard, Minister of Labor and Health, with the view, if court action fails to obtain new legislation for the protection of cancer victims.

The Minister has long been interested in a possible cure for cancer, and in 1920 founded the Franco-American Anti-Cancer League. His determination to prosecute one of the many so-called institutes which guarantee to cure the disease without surgery arises from discussions at the recent international congress at Strasbourg at which demonstrations were adduced to show that surgery, combined with X-Ray treatment, could cure cancer.

Chief of Police Corrigan, while executing his official duties was attacked by a mob of outlaws and so badly beaten that it will be some days before he will be able to attend duty. He is suffering from a sprained ankle and faces badly cut and swollen. Town citizens are indignant over the affair and special police were called to arrest the guilty parties. The search continued till midnight when three offenders were arrested. A number of others connected with the affair could not be located but warrants have been issued for their arrest. Citizens are determined to leave nothing undone to bring the guilty parties to answer the charge. In the meantime two drunks were arrested but not connected with the assault. Chief Corrigan is an efficient Officer and has the respect of all the town citizens who are determined to see that the police will be protected in the discharge of their duty.—H.

—NEW BUILDING NEAR COMPLETION.—The new building that P. McNutt & Sons are erecting in Kensington is rushing to completion. It is located on the site of the Kensington Sash and Door Factory that was destroyed by fire some time ago. It is conveniently adjacent to the railway track and station. The cellar is 48 feet x 60 feet, and 9 feet deep, thus giving a storage capacity of 25200 cubic feet. This converted into bushels will be capable of storing about 20,000 bushels of potatoes. The protection will insure security in time of frost and at the same time afford ample reserve room to handle stock to accommodate a fluctuating market. The building will be a finished piece of model architecture and will greatly enhance the union of the town. The foreman in charge of the building is Mr. John Mountain, a relative of Mr. Michael Mountain, retired R. R. section foreman, Kensington, Y.
