CANADA AND IMPERIAL DEFENCE.

We are glad to note that the Canadian Government is seriously considering the duty of taking some share in the preparations for the naval defence of the Empire. True Canada has no warships and Britain has many, and these are supposed to stand ready to defend the commerce, ports and coasts in every part of the world where the British flag floats. Canada has in training militia forces for her own defence against attacks by land, but has made no preparation against the more frequent danger of attacks by sea.

In this regard, as we pointed out the other day, our ways are unequal. To only one power is it possible to march an army by land into Canada. That nation is related by ties of blood, of language and literature and has been at peace with us for almost a hundred years. So strong is the faith in perpetual peace on both sides of the vastly extended boundary that neither party has attempted to maintain forts or defences along its course. But there would be real danger to both our coasts and our commerce should war break out between Britain and any one of half a dozen naval powers,—danger, not of conquest, perhaps, but of loss and spoliation,—even while Britain holds her present supremacy of the seas, which may yet be threatened.

Beyond question Canada is bound in right and honor, to be prepared to defend her own ports and commerce

as much as to protect her landed territories from invasion. If we do not build or buy warships of our own, we ought at least to contribute to the cost of the superb and costly fleets to which we look for defence. This duty seems too plain to admit of dispute or of argument. And Canada is also better able to do this than are the heavily taxed people of the British Isles, on whom has fallen the colossal burden of the extension and defence of the entire Empire during a century or more that is past.

Behind this lies an duty that Canada may have with regard to the general defence of the Empire and its commerce. That duty, however lightly it may be held by the few, has been fully recognized by the Canadian people in the case of the Boer war. It would be as promptly recognized today should a like emergency again arise. The Canadian people value our free British institutions, they value the traditions and the glory of the flag beneath which we enjoy our exalted liberties. Every Canadian knows that but for the strong arm of Britain the Canadian Dominion would not now be in existence. We have a duty toward the Empire apart from the mere selfish duty of being prepared to defend ourselves, and that duty binds us to assist as best we can in the defence of any and every portion of the widespread Empire whenever and wherever it may be lawlessly assailed.

THE APPROACH TOWARD THE SOUTH POLE.

Whatever may be the advantages accruing to the world from the persistent search for the North and South Poles, it may be said that the results achieved by Lieutenant Shackleton of the British Navy, recently announced, have been the most satisfactory of the long series of polar adventures. Not only did his expedition get nearer to its objective point than any other—within 111 miles of the South Pole—but in addition extensive geographical discoveries were made. Eight mountain chains were found and more than a hundred peaks put upon the map for the first time. And for the first time mount Erebus, the great Antarctic volcano

It is announced that next month A. J. Dawson, editor of the London Standard of Empire will revisit Canada, touring the Dominion during April and May. He is a member of the organising committee of the Imperial Press Conference which is to meet in London in June. Mr. Dawson will reach Vancouver in time to meet the press delegates from Australia and New Zealand and to return to London with them. We think an effort should be made to have Mr. Dawson, and if possible the Antipodean delegates also, visit Prince Edward Island on their journey outward or homeward.

We are glad to find that the enthusiastic Patriot gas humanely added to the Capes airship, "a lifeboat sufficient to hold the passengers and crew, should the airship get cranky in the middle of the Strait and take a drop into the water." But when the airship dropped precipitately on top of the lifeboat, from a height of fifty or one hundred feet, what would the lives of the passengers be worth? And a lifeboat of its itself a thing of weight, and whatever it would weigh must be deducted from the weight of the mails and passengers to be taken over. At that rate a fleet of Zeppelin airships would be required for the mails and passengers alone, to say nothing of the freight. Wireless telegraphy is an altogether different affair, free from the dangers and difficulties of aerial navigation.

ascended to the rim of its crater.

Lieutenant Shackleton is not quite thirty-five years of age, and should the French expedition under Dr. Charcot, now on a like mission, fail to reach the South Pole, he may be expected to try again, and with a better prospect of success. Beyond the mountain chains which Lieut. Shackleton crossed he found a plateau stretching toward the Pole. His equipment consisted of motor sledges, Manchurian ponies and Esquimo dogs. The motor sledges proved serviceable in the first part of the journey in carrying forward supplies and establishing depots. The ponies, had to be shot one by one owing to the want of food, while the dogs held out to the end. Lieutenant Shackleton has made the polar record of the twentieth century, but it may not long remain unbroken. Others will try and go farther and he may try again under the stimulus of a world-wide interest and the great success already achieved.

MacGregor's salary will be \$20,000. His promotion is due to services in the matter of the Fisheries dispute.
