GOOD RACING YESTERDAY AT THE DRIVING PARK

A beautiful afternoon yesterday favored the Charlottetown Driving Park Association and the Tourist Association in the summer races at the Driving Park.

There was an excellent attendance for the summer races, both balconies of the Grand Stand being well filled with spectators and many lining the fences and the track.

The track was in excellent condition, a fact an expert gave it as his opinion that it was never in better order for making foot time.

There was but one feature of complaint and that was a general one among the spectators on the Grand Stand. Except for the knowing ones who were acquainted with the horses it was impossible in many cases to find out the winners in the different heats and hundreds of people at in blissful ignorance of the results of the races.

The officials of the day were as follows: Starter—J. J. Davies. Judges—Dr. F. S. McDonald, Souris; C. Rogers, Summerside; J. P. Woodruff, city.

Timekeepers—Louis H. Beer, Dr. H. Johnson. Distance Judge—P. J. McMahon. At 2:10 the first heat of the 250 was held.

250 CLASS (FIRST HEAT). Three horses faced the starter in the first heat. Tony Belle drew the pole, Krenmut and Kalol third. They stayed at the first score Krenmut in the lead, Tony Belle second and Kalol third. This position they maintained till the half when Tony Belle took first position. At the 3/4 mile, Kalol was considerable distance in the rear but he gradually pulled up, passed Tony Belle and broke badly, and secured a good second position. Time 2:44.

250 CLASS (SECOND HEAT). The horses got off on the second score, Krenmut and Tony well together and Kalol some distance in the rear. Coming out to the stretch at the first half Krenmut had a nice race but near the finish Tony Belle went off her feet and Kalol who had gradually closed up the long distance he was in the rear at the end of the second the three being well ahead. Time 2:41.

250 CLASS (THIRD HEAT). Tony Belle took the lead but broke badly at the half and Krenmut went to first place which she held for the remainder of the race. Kalol at the end went to second place passing Tony Belle that thus went back to third. Time 2:43.

224 TROT AND PACE (FIRST HEAT).

Four horses started in this race in the following order: Main Keel (pole), Capitola second, Erica, third and Kaiser G. fourth. Main took the lead and though she broke badly at the half and went to third place she worked again to first and won the heat with Capitola second, Kaiser G. third, Erica fourth. For second place Capitola and Kaiser G. had a close contest. Time 2:30.

224 TROT AND PACE (SECOND HEAT).

The horses were started on the first score. At the quarter Main Keel went to first, Capitola that had been leading went to second, Kaiser G. held third and Erica fourth. This order they held till the finish, the first three being well bunched. Time 2:30.

224 TROT AND PACE (THIRD HEAT).

Kaiser G. took the lead at the start with Main Keel second, Capitola third and Erica fourth. At the half Main Keel went to first place which she held throughout winning heat and race with Kaiser G. a good second and the other two some distance behind. Time 2:29.

235 TROT AND PACE (FIRST HEAT).

Four horses faced the starter. Parker C. had the pole, Betsy Cameron second, Jean third and Kinkora fourth. The horses got an excellent start at the sixth score. At the 1/4 mile Betsy and Kinkora were neck and neck but a bad break by the latter put her back to third position. At the 1/2 mile Jean had pulled up and was on even terms with Betsy, passing the grand stand neck and neck. The second half was a very pretty contest between these but Jean was too much for the brown mare and received first place. Kinkora and Parker C. were third and fourth some distance in the rear. Time 2:30.

235 TROT AND PACE (SECOND HEAT).

The horses got off on the fifth score, Betsy Cameron took the lead and held it till coming into the stretch at the final. She was chased hard throughout by Jean who was at the hind wheel during the whole race and won by a neck just as they reached the wire. Kinkora had made a bad break at the quarter and though he lost considerable distance took third place with Parker C. fourth. Time 2:31.

235 TROT AND PACE (THIRD HEAT).

In this heat Dan Steele was placed behind Kinkora and he succeeded in bringing him up from third to first winning in a magnificent finish by little more than a neck over Betsy Cameron amid great applause. Jean was in third position and Parker C. fourth. Time 2:30 1/2.

235 TROT AND PACE (FOURTH HEAT).

Great things were looked for from Kinkora with Dan Steele behind but she broke badly while leading up the back stretch running nearly half a mile. Betsy Cameron won first place Jean, second, Parker C. third and Kinkora fourth. Time 2:29 1/2.

235 TROT AND PACE (FIFTH HEAT).

All the other classes having been finished twenty minutes were allowed before the next heat was called. Great interest was centered in this heat as each of three of the four starters had won heats. The horses got away on the first score Kinkora breaking almost immediately and losing considerable time. Betsy Cameron took the lead and though pressed hard by Jean was never headed. Jean secured second, Kinkora, third and Parker C. fourth. Time 2:31 1/2.

235 TROT AND PACE (SIXTH HEAT).

In this heat the three horses having previously won heats started. Kinkora broke just after starting and lost badly. Jean and Betsy Cameron had a close race but the latter won the heat and race with the former at her wheel. Time 2:31.

NEWFOUNDLAND'S BIG LAND DEAL

MONTREAL, July 28.—(Special).—The biggest pulp deal in Canada's history was completed here today when a group of English publishers secured control of the total interest of the Red Newfoundland Lumber Co., the Exploit Co., the Newfoundland Timber and Estate Co. and Newfoundland Lumber Co.

These controlled between them a million and half acres of pulp lands.

THE Electric Light Sports held last night at the C. A. A. Grounds under the auspices of the Abegweits and the firemen were undoubtedly the most successful of the kind to take place in Charlottetown. It is estimated that over 1200 people were present and continued interest was maintained from start to the finish.

The first event called was the 100 yards run. In the final heat was James McMillan, Lukeman, Frank McDonald, and Cormier. The first won amid great applause by inches in 10 1/5 seconds.

The 300 yards run with Hook and Laddard raising of ladder was made by the Corps in 61 1/5 seconds. Toombs scaled the ladder nimbly.

The half mile run was a hard contest between Fred Jenkins and H. Harley, but the latter won by a few inches with P. Duffy third. Time 2:08 1/5.

The Hose Reel corps made the quarter with reel and laid 200 feet of hose in 1 min. 24 sec. A. Hennessey did the coupling and E. Hertz was the hydrant man.

The quarter mile bike was won by S. Doyle, Gordon Hughes second, and Percy Peardon third in 35 2/5 sec. and the mile bike by Gordon Hughes with Percy Peardon second. Time 2 min. 30 sec.

Teams from the Victorias, from the Abegweits and from the Firemen were entered for the quarter mile run with Salvage Corps wagon. The Victorias won in 63 sec. Abegweits 64 sec. and Firemen 68 sec. There was considerable dispute about the time of the winners, the timers' watches showing a wide variety.

The 110 yards dash for firemen in regulation attire was won by A. Hennessey with D. A. Ferguson second. Time 13 sec.

Halpenny got the broad jump with 20ft. 5 in. J. M. McDonald, Pietou, second and Lukeman third. The visitors found great difficulty in getting the "take off."

Lukeman easily won the 1/4 mile run in 55 1/5 seconds, with P. A. Duffy second.

The 220 yards dash for firemen went to E. Hertz, with D. A. Ferguson second. Time 30 2/5 seconds.

The high jump was one of the best events of the night. After a hard fight Halpenny defeated Macdonald, of "Pietou" clearing 5 ft. 6 in. This event was closely watched though the hour was late.

The Fourth Regiment Band furnish excellent music.

The electric lighting was not of the most advanced kind and frequently the grounds were enveloped in entire darkness for brief periods while a policeman's services were in constant demand to keep each particular light in action.
