Mill Feed Costs

It is to be hoped that something material will result from today's agricultural conference at Moncton. Mr. W. R. Shaw, deputy Minister of Agriculture, is attending from this Province and the subject under discussion will be the problem of getting feed to Maritime farmers as cheaply as possible. The conference, it is stated, will not be limited to talking over ways and means of having freight rates reduced on mill feeds coming into the Maritimes from Western Canada for Maritime consumption. This was the subject of a brief drawn up last winter and presented to Dominion officials, apparently without result. The brief pointed out, among other things, that feed for export could be transported by rail to Maritime ports cheaper than feeds for Maritime consumption, and urged the necessity of considering this if Maritime farmers were to continue raising livestock, especially hogs. Among the remedies suggested were a lowering of freight rates on mill feeds destined for Maritime consumption, and a reduction by federal demand of the cost of such feeds to Maritime farmers.

It will be recalled that prior to the last federal election, a number of requests were forwarded to the government on this subject, which effected the fact that the matter was under consideration. This was more than six months ago, and the mill feed question remains unsettled.

It is to be regretted that this question was not more fully discussed at the last session of Parliament. It is closely connected with Canada's war effort, so far as livestock production in the Maritimes is concerned; and until a solution is found there is little hope of our farmers being able to produce at a reasonable margin of profit. There is no desire to make excess profits, but the problem, under present conditions, has been to carry on without incurring losses. The western wheat growers, having received consideration of their problem from Parliament, would, of course, through their representatives, have been prepared to back up the claims of our Maritime members for cheaper mill feed if the issue had been placed before them.

Perhaps where our parliamentary representatives failed the officials in session today at Moncton may succeed in suggesting some scheme which will appeal to the Dominion Government and the railway authorities, and which will be put into effect without further undue delay.

No War Jitters There

Scanning the theatre pages of the New York and the latest London papers to arrive in Canada, a mainland contemporary says one might think the danger of air raids was in New York and not in London. There are only eight legitimate theatres running in the Broadway area. In the West End of London there are twenty-five. Two of them are devoted to grand opera and ballet. The old war-time favorite, "Chu-Chin Chow," is revived at the Palace, and it only needs a revival of "The Byng Boys" to make old timers happy. George Robey of happy last-war memory is still available. Alfred Lester, his lugubrious companion is dead, and Violet Lorraine is retired since her marriage to the son of a duke.

That so many theatres should be carrying on in such times is another demonstration of the coolness with which the British people are facing up to their ordeal.

Liberal Press Comment

The Winnipeg Free Press (Liberal) joins in the chorus which has been urging upon Prime Minister Mackenzie King the need of forming "a real war cabinet." It points out that even the special war committee of the cabinet, created in order to make it easier for the ministers whose departments were most closely connected with war to meet at frequent intervals for purposes of discussion and decision, has since grown until it includes ten ministers. It has become too unwieldy in numbers and it has the additional disadvantage of being composed of men, all of whom,—with the possible exception of Mr. King himself—are far too loaded down with departmental responsibility and routine to be able to spare the time needed ever to stand back from the detailed part of the war effort which they administer to get a continuous clear view of our war policy seen as a whole and in the long-run.

While the Free Press does not suggest to its party leader that he should get away from partisan politics in his cabinet selection, it does hint that the time "perhaps has come to follow the example of Mr. Lloyd George in the last war and of Mr. Churchill in this one." It urges a small war cabinet of members "heretofore of all departmental routine, upon whom all major problems of policy and organization would devolve." The present situation, it respectfully suggests, "cannot continue, for it has become apparent that the war's progress today upon the men in the conditions of Ottawa has already surpassed the limits of their physical strength."

A new situation has been created by the Permanent Joint Defence Board, composed of both Canadian and United States representatives. "Here," says the Free Press "there emerges immediately a whole series of fresh problems, many

of them of enormous long-range importance. Are these problems to be met piecemeal? Are we to apply temporary expedients and ad hoc solutions to them; or is there to be somewhere a small group of ministers who can at their leisure and with relatively fresh minds think out the implications of each step we take? This is a matter of very great importance; and it is altogether unlikely that under present conditions, any members of the Government will be free enough to tackle it as it should be done. Certainly the members of the war committee cannot do it so long as they are burdened and harassed for 15 hours a day by the detailed administration of a cumbersome departmental machine. Under such conditions it is unlikely that our joint defence measures with the United States can be anything but a part-time job for already over-burdened men. Nor, taking the present set-up into consideration, can they be blamed. Each day each man is pursued and worried by the immediate day-to-day problems of his department. Each day all that he can do is to produce some expedient that will tide his department over and keep the wheels going for another 24 hours."

EDITORIAL NOTES

The Boy Scouts and Girl Guides will be inspected by the Chief Scout for Canada and Chief Guide the Earl of Athlone and Princess Alice on their arrival at the station on Saturday. All must be in full uniform—and on time.

Several privates in the Australian contingent are wealthy men in private life. One has given up an income of \$8000 a year. There was a scene of commotion at the pay office when he endeavored to have a deposit of \$8000 entered in his pay book as pocket money.

A contract amounting to \$600,000 for six large rescue boats for the Royal Air Force has been placed with the Aero-Marine Crafts of Toronto. The rescue launches, between 60 and 70 feet in length and with three engines, will do thirty-five knots. They will be used on the English coasts.

The Canadian Active Service Force in Canada now numbers 114,000, with an additional 40,000 men in England. In the non-permanent active militia—corresponding to the United States National Guard—another 100,000 men have enlisted.

The General Council of New Caledonia has unanimously decided to continue the fight against the Axis Powers. A resolution expressing the determination of New Caledonia, "a country French in heart and soul which cannot admit the surrender of the Bordeaux government and its result in setting the French against their Allies of yesterday," was sent to the British Consul at Noumea. More than 4,000 persons took part in a remarkable demonstration, which testified to the colony's resolution to continue the fight on the side of the British for the liberation of France.

Oliver Wendell Holmes, American author and physician, born this date, 1809. His poetry is graceful and ingenious; as a prose essayist he ranks high:

There has been no interlude in recruiting for Canada's Active Service Force units, which still have room in their ranks for men with the proper qualifications. Some confusion may have arisen in the minds of potential recruits for the C.A.S.F. by the suspension of enrolment in the N.P.A.M. on August 15. The latter suspension, however, does not apply in any manner to the C.A.S.F., which is continuing recruiting without interruption as is evident by the number of youths reporting daily at the recruiting offices here.

The demand for fresh blueberries on the New York wholesale market has been exceptionally good this season, but the supplies have been below average, according to a report from the office of the Canadian Trade Commissioner in New York. Prices have been above the 1939 levels in almost all cases. The blueberry crops throughout the eastern United States suffered from a severe winter and the hot dry spell in July and early August cut down the crop still further. The New York market, states the report, could very easily absorb Canadian shipments of good quality fresh blueberries.

The necessity for quarantining evacuee children before sending them to their new temporary homes is exemplified in the case of the contingent sent to Ontario. Hon Paul Leduc, acting Provincial Minister of Welfare, cites development of one case of diphtheria among the 55 British children who arrived in Toronto. "The Government has been criticized for the detention of these British children in Toronto for a few days," Mr. Leduc said. "I think that this incident completely justifies our procedure. We have taken and are taking every possible precaution to safeguard both the children and those into whose homes they are to be placed." Thomas Cowan, 13, is the diphtheria sufferer. Since reaching Toronto, one of the children has undergone an emergency appendectomy. Mr. Leduc said he is progressing "favorably."

Dr. Gallup's Investigators reported that five million Americans would be interested in the shelter for the duration of the war as a child refugee from England, or as the American newspapers now say, following the suggestion made by the Canadian Government to accept a guest child from Britain. It has been a long time since feeling has been so stirred in the United States as it is regarding the fate of the children of the "lost" war. Look after them proceed, despite the cold water which Churchill has thrown. The pictures which have appeared in the newspapers have increased American sympathy for admitting a sinking feeling in the pit of their stomachs as they think of the thousands of these children still subject the hazards of German attack, who by their appearance might well be their own. Said one American: "I always thought I could spot an Englishman but they must acquire those distinctive characteristics in after life. The children might be our own." Naturally then American mothers have been stirred. It is they who answer the British statement that because of the children's collapse they have no ships to spare to convey the children, by urging that ships under American protection be employed for the purpose. — Moncton Transcript.

Laudable as is the desire of the U. S. Congress and Red Cross to alleviate the sufferings of at least a few of the children of France the position of Britain can be appreciated. Great Britain sees in the blockade her most powerful weapon for the eventual defeat of Germany. She is spending valuable lives and huge sums of money to make the blockade as complete and devastating as possible. Every extra mouth that Germany must feed from its already depleted food stocks brings victory just so much nearer. If she could be certain that every pound of food allowed through the blockade in Red Cross ships went only to the civilian population of France, or to the children, there is no doubt but that their ships would be allowed through without question. GRASSHOPPER BAIT

Sir:—I have been informed there is a serious infestation of grasshoppers in some sections of the country and that some damage has been done to crops. We have inquired into the matter and find that the most successful measure of combating this pest is prepared in the following manner: Bran 12 lbs. Screened sawdust 12 lbs. Paris Green 1 lb. Molasses (or) salt 1 qt. or 1 lb. Water 2 to 3 gallons. Mix together the dry ingredients (Bran, sawdust and Paris green), then mix the molasses or the salt in the water. Pour this solution little at a time over the poisoned bran-sawdust and mix together with the hands thoroughly. Add just enough of the liquid so as to make the mixture moist but not sloppy.

Broadcast this bait at the rate of about 15 to 20 lbs. per acre over the surface of the ground where the hoppers are present, as in crops, pastures, etc. The bait should be spread in the morning of a bright day. This material is very poisonous and every precaution should be taken to prevent cattle or other animals from having access to unused bait containers. If any bait is left over, bury it deeply in the ground to remove all possibility of danger. When properly applied there should be no danger to stock, birds or poultry from picking up the poisoned bait directly or from eating the plants from the treated land.
