**ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETINGS.**

The annual school meetings throughout the province will be held on Tuesday, June 21. It is not too much to say that no other public meeting of any kind approaches this meeting in importance. On the conclusions arrived at and the measures adopted at this meeting will depend very largely the future welfare of those who in a few years will be the men and women of the province, the makers and unmakers of governments, the legislators, the farmers, the professionals, the citizens. There is nothing more important than this, nothing imposing a greater responsibility than this upon the men and women of the province. For this reason every man and woman in each school district who realizes his or her responsibility to themselves, to their neighbor, to their country, will lay aside every other duty and attend the meeting.

It has generally been found in the past that those who have no other interest in the school than to grudgingly pay, the annual school assessment and when only desire in connection with the school to keep its expenses down to the lowest possible figure, regardless of consequences to the pupils, are those who may be depended upon to be present. They will be there to vote against improvements, to vote down supplements, to preach the gospel of false economy. This is why all those who realize their duty and their responsibility in connection with the school should make it a point to be there.

Through a system of false economy and penuriousness continued for many years we have starved the teaching profession and left our schools with almost bare walls and with little equipment. What the children and our province have lost through this economy will never be known but to our cost we know that our schools are not what they ought to be and the cause is starvation.

This must be overcome. It has been overcome to some extent in the past few years. Better equipment has in many cases been provided; many schools have increased their supplements but in almost all cases the teacher's salary is no better than that of the domestic servant or the farm hand. If our schools are to be of any service, if they are to be the means of helping our children up to useful and respectable manhood and womanhood, if they are to be, as they ought to be, the means of making our country great, then we must pay our teachers a respectable living wage and we must provide them with adequate

equipment for teaching. This should be done at our annual meetings on the 21st instant.

We trust the women throughout the province will not forget that they are qualified to vote at these meetings and also that they are eligible for appointment as trustees. We hope to see many lady trustees elected at this year's school meetings for there is no question that generally speaking they are wider awake to the importance of the schools than men are. The "lords of creation" have had their innings, let the "ladies of creation" now try their hand.

**TECHNICAL EDUCATION REPORT.**

The first annual report of the Director of Technical Education for Canada has just been issued. As the report covers only the year ending June 30, 1920, the Prince Edward Island technical school, which opened in September last year, is not included.

The report, which was prepared by Professor Gill, Director of Technical Education for Canada, who is well known in this province of which he is a native, is a particularly interesting one and should be in the hands not of technical teachers alone, but of the teachers in all our schools.

The aim in the establishment of technical schools, as laid down in this report, is really the aim of every school and when a primary or other school falls short of this aim it falls short of what a school ought to be.

The establishment of schools for technical education originated in a recommendation made by a Royal Commission on education established in 1910. This commission laid down as "The aim of industrial and technical education" as follows:

- Give us Men! Men—from every rank, Fresh and free and frank; Men of thought and reading, Men of light and leading, Men of loyal breeding, The Nation's welfare speeding; Men of faith and not of fiction, Men of lofty aim in action; Give us Men—I say again, Give us men!
- Give us Men! Strong and stalwart ones; Men whom highest hope inspires, Men whom purest honor fires, Men who trample self beneath them, Men who make their country venerate them, As her noble sons, Worthy of their sires, Men who never shame their mothers, Men who never fall their brothers, TRUE, however false are others; Give us Men—I say again, Give us Men!
- Give us Men! Men who, when the tempest gathers, Grasp the Standard of their fathers, In the thickest fight; Men who strike for home and altar, (Let the coward cringe and falter) God defend the right! True as truth though torn and lonely, Tender, as the brave are only; Men who tread where saints have trod, Men for Country—home—and God Give us Men! I say again—again— Give us such Men!

**Current Comment**

ASTER. Premiers and governments are not customarily forced into concession processes by the blustering of the opposing party press, and when that game is played it is a challenge to a fight.

And this is the attitude and these the tactics adopted by the Liberal press in relation to this delegation from the three Liberal Governments of the Lower Provinces. Following, in true parrot style, their leading papers from the other provinces, the Patriot of Saturday joins in the political cry. It says, most untruthfully, that "Hon. Mr. Meighen's reply to the delegates is EXCEEDINGLY INDEFINITE." They utter this untruth with full knowledge before them that the Premier's reply was not only of the MOST DEFINITE character, but was as satisfactory and as comprehensive as any Prime Minister could possibly give before consulting with his colleagues. That answer was that "The Government will weigh carefully all the arguments presented and WILL DO ALL THAT WE CAN OR THAT CAN BE DONE IN THE MATTER WITHOUT INJUSTICE TO OTHER PARTS OF THE DOMINION." What more

definite or satisfactory answer could any man give? Isn't the straight pledge to "do all that we can" definite enough for anybody outside of a born fool? And if not, what more could any government do?

But they say:—"Mr. Meighen dwells upon the need of avoiding any injustice to the rest of Canada? Do they expect to cash a claim that is embodied in injustice to any interest, or do they class the Meighen Government amongst those prepared to perpetrate injustice? If so they have made a most serious blunder. Our claim, as we put it, does not involve injustice to any one, but justice to us, and it is the absolute right of the Government to look into this question for themselves to be assured of these things, without accepting dictation or being bullied by the Liberal press. And before the type has dried, which announced the Premier's most favourable reply, they launch their threats against the Government, to bring the matter "even more vigorously, and confronting them still more clearly with the consequences of their neglect." And with these hostile partisan taunts and blusterings, in a sub-judicial matter they are kicking these our most sacred interests around in their political football grounds.

If the object of these Liberal Premiers is to secure a measure of justice in a matter of public concern, and this we maintain should be their whole purpose, they will have the support of all our Maritime people, our Conservative press, and beyond doubt the solid sympathy of Premier Meighen and his Government, who will deal with it as an issue of practical public business, unrelated to party. But if on the other hand it is one of their schemes, concocted and piled for no other purpose than working up some false prejudice against the Ottawa Government, as their press conduct plainly indicates it to be, then by holding their red rag up to a man of Premier Meighen's capacity, who is hon-

**THE OLD GARDENER SAYS**  
As soon as your early flowering shrubs have finished blooming, give them a good cutting back if you think they need trimming. If you wait until fall you will cut off the flowers buds which are made during the summer. Really the best way to handle Forsythia, Deutzia, and such shrubs is to cut out the old canes where they emerge from the ground so that the new wood will have a chance to develop. Nipping off the ends isn't of much advantage except to give a more symmetrical shape to the bushes. If you remove the old flower heads from the lilacs and rhododendrons you will have more blossoms next year.

**Dead Yet Speaking**

An interesting fact which so far has not seen the light of publicity was disclosed when the executors of Sir Wilfrid Laurier opened the safety deposit box where the dead statesman kept his personal papers. In the middle of a bundle of insurance policies and other documents of a similar nature was a holograph letter from King George offering Sir Wilfrid a peerage. It was obvious that Sir Wilfrid had placed the letter there with intention. It could not escape even the most careless eye. So far as we know Sir Wilfrid never mentioned this matter to his friends while he was alive. It was a great surprise to his executors, one of whom at least, had shared his most intimate confidence. But Sir Wilfrid was a man who loved honor, and the secret he cherished while living he had left this earthly scene. A peerage would not have made Sir Wilfrid a greater man, but he was human enough to be pleased that his greatness was fittingly recognised in the highest places.

**The Esperanto.**

Esperanto, pride of the Gloucester fishing fleet and speed champion of two countries, deserved a better fate than to be sunk by hitting a submerged wreck. But there is consolation in the knowledge that her loss was not due to any defect in design or rigging. She had the reputation of being the well-nigh perfect fishing schooner and it would have been a pity if this reputation had gone down with her off Sable Island. Her destruction is of less importance now that we know her crew is safe. The news of the rescue came as specially cheering tidings to thousands of readers whose interest in the boat has been keen ever since her victory over her Canadian rival Delawana last fall in the world's first international race between fishing schooners. From that time onward she was destined to enjoy a national fame, much like that which still attaches to the America and the successful defenders of the Queen's Cup. But aside from the fame of the boat, the story of the escape of the Esperanto's crew in dories is thrilling. We can spare the swift schooner, fine as she was; but the loss of the men who sailed in her would have been heartrending indeed.

**Let Her Stay in Russia**

The friends in this country of Emma Goldman are saying once more that she is anxious to come back here and stay for the rest of her days. Probably this is true. What is certain is that she should not be allowed to return. She was never American in any respect. She violated the laws of the United States. Her punishment was apparently almost a reward. She was banished to a land in which the conditions were exactly those which she wished to prevail in the United States. The fact that Emma Goldman has been unhappy in Russia does not wipe out the memory of her offences in America. She and her fellow-anarchists wished to plunge good times that were here, for the this country into confusion and dis- admiring audiences and the fat liv- order. For trying to bring about chaos she was sent to chaos. Now she may be regretful, but there is no real remorse. She longs for the nearest approach to it that the world has seen.
