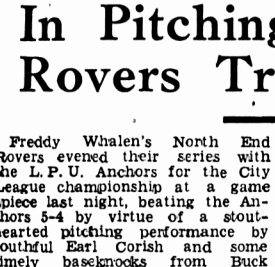
Both teams played tight ball in the field, giving their pitchers excellent support, with Elmer Rice giving an outstanding display at the Rovers' hot corner.

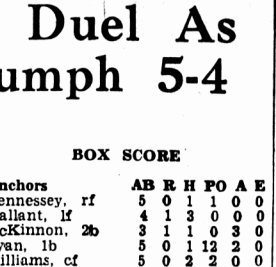

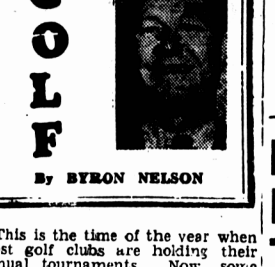
