Loses Life In Explosion

(Associated Press) OGDENSBURG, N. Y., May 29—One man lost his life and 15 others risked theirs in an explosion and fire that wrecked a drill boat on the St. Lawrence River near here early today at the spot where a similar boat was blown to pieces last year with a loss of seven lives and the injury of 17 men.

The dead man was Herbert Reynolds of Alexandria Bay and formerly of Hartford, Conn. A mechanic, he was at work in the compression room when gasoline exploded. So badly burned that he could not swim, he drowned after leaping into the river.

Lobsters Moves In Quantities

Glace Bay Landlord Cancels Rent Arrears

GLACE BAY, N. S., May 30—Robert Newton's tenants are mostly miners. On half-time for the last few years, they find it pretty hard to make both ends meet; and some of them haven't paid rent for months.

To-day each of them had a letter from Mr. Newton. But it wasn't the eviction notice they had been daily expecting since other Cape Breton landlords began turning out tenants this Spring.

"Better times are coming," Mr. Newton explained, "and I know they'll pay me when they're able. Many of them have been renting my houses for years, and they've always paid when they had the money, so why shouldn't I help them out a little now that they're up against it?"

Tenants of the landlord who lives at Little Bras d'Or, says that in the past he has been notably generous, never demanding full rent in cases where it would cause hardship to a family.
