A VERY graphic pen picture of the serious condition of affairs which resulted in San Francisco after the earthquake and fire is given in a letter written by Wallace McLellan to his brother Seymour of Alexandria, Lot 40. The writer was in San Francisco all through the exciting time, and states that many people were shot by the guards for stealing. After being shot the corpses were placed where all could see them, with notices attached stating why they had been killed. A number of people went insane as a result of their terrible experiences. In one place Mr. McLellan saw a number of people burned to death in an upper story as there was no means of escape from the building. Mr. McLellan's brother John was also with him in San Francisco during the earthquake.

The characteristic was manifested last night by the hearty applause which greeted every number of the program, amounting in several instances to a demand for an encore, which was generously given in every case. Each member of the Club is an artist, albeit, evidently an enthusiast. Their work, therefore, could not fail to be an exemplification of accurate conception and interpretation, of exquisite quality of tone, of subordinate self-restraint in counter phrasing, of perfect sympathy and accord. Needless to say the selections afforded scope for admirable technique, but not one offered any apparent difficulty to the capable performers. A more conscientious, talented, mutually adapted aggregation of artists has rarely before visited us. Their performance was a delight throughout in every part. Time and space do not permit of more than the crudest generalization. Of all the numbers perhaps the most generally pleasing was part (a) of the second number (Dernier sommeil de la Vierge) and the exquisite encore to the same so generously given;—this, and the selection played by Mr. Dodge in response to a recall. The solo work of each and every performer who had numbers assigned to them was an exhibition of execution and tone production such as is rarely heard in our community. The happy feeling which effervesced among these genial musicians seemed to reach and pervade the delighted audience. A more enjoyable musical treat has seldom been given in Charlottetown. Professor Watts, who was responsible for the appearance here of the Sextette Club, the music-loving colony living here is appreciatively grateful.
