THE MARKETS ATTRACTIVE DRUGSTORE

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 17.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was extremely dull, there being practically no demand from foreign buyers. The domestic trade was also quiet but prices were well maintained. Carlots of Ontario and Quebec No. 2 white oats were quoted at 53 cents, No. 3 white at 51½ and No. 4 at 50 cents per bushel ex track. Canadian western grades were steadily and the trade in spring and winter wheat flour was inactive but prices were steady. The demand for millfeed was steady and the tone was firm. The market for standard grades of oats was moderately active and steady. Extreme dullness marked the trade in cheese and butter. The demand for eggs remained good and values were firm.

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.—Egg prices remain firm but the demand is quite as brisk as expected at this time of the year. American markets are firmer and refrigerators are higher in Chicago than in Now York which is quite unusual. Prices on dressed turkeys are holding decidedly firm. Toronto jobbing fresh specials 80, extras 75, firsts 60, storage extras 46, firsts 43, seconds 37.
