FLIERS SAIL AND SAILORS FLY TO LEARN EACH OTHERS JOB

A new scheme of liaison between officers of the Royal Air Force and the Merchant Navy has brought about another strange war-time twist in jobs. From planes of air convoys skippers of cargo vessels study the tactics of airmen protecting their vessels while, on the water, airmen from the decks of merchant ships learn the routine and difficulties from the seamen's point of view. In this way each gets a realistic idea if the other's work and co-operation between convoys and protecting aircraft is facilitated. "Dark Horse" In Republican Ranks

WASHINGTON, July 18 — (AP) — The name of Hanford MacNider was injected today into speculation over possible "dark horse" entries in the Republican nomination for President of the United States in 1944.

Senator Gerald Nye (Rep.-N. D.) advanced the suggestion that if the choice had to be made at this time, MacNider, with his military record, would make "an ideal candidate." He suggested, however, that even the type of candidate the Republicans should pick "must await developments along the war and home fronts."

Now a Brigadier General, MacNider is on active army duty in an undisclosed assignment.

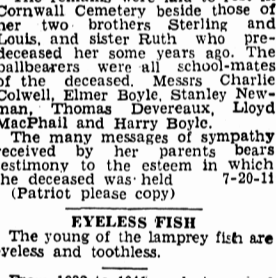
