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publish a volume containing a complete history of such development from the beginning and Mr. Shaw has promised to prepare the necessary material for this Province. Just how interesting the story of our road development may be can be inferred from an item uncovered when changing the rule of the road last session. In order to change the law covering this case the original statute had to be amended and it was found that, in addition to providing for passing to the left, it further provided that any person driving a horse-drawn vehicle was obliged to get out of his cart or carriage, attach a piece of rope of a certain length and strength to the horse's head at a distance of twenty feet from the party coming in the opposite direction, and lead his horse past, and I believe this was the law of this Province until last March.

FIFTH:—Danger Signs. The symbols already in use were approved, and some new ones adopted. SIXTH:—Dealt mainly with Railways Crossing, and means for protecting the public on level grade crossings. These were carefully considered and a number of recommendations made. It was further arranged that a strong committee should meet the Railway management to discuss many improvements needed at these crossings.

These were the principal matters considered in relation to Highway Departments but under the Motor Vehicle Department many other subjects were discussed, some of which are, use and regulation of the Autobus—a real live problem in some of the Provinces where the heavy bus on country roads is very destructive. It was decided to draw up a model set of traffic regulations to be adopted by all the Provinces, and to recommend a uniform headlight not to exceed 21 candle power on all cars. The question of compelling all carriages to carry lights was considered but no action taken. Gasoline tax.—This was approved as a metered tax on the highway user, and I believe every Province in Canada will have a gasoline tax of from two to three cents per gallon next year.

Tourist Traffic.—This association has always been a booster for tourist business and many suggestions for its regulation and limitation were put forward. I was glad to be able to state that we have a real live Tourist Association on Prince Edward Island, and that it has secured remarkable results during the past season. The necessity for accurate statistics was stressed, and plans suggested for obtaining same next year.

"Safety on the Highways" occupied a large place on the programme as well as many other items which I cannot touch in detail. I might say that under "Motor Vehicle Departments" twenty-six separate headings were considered, which will give an idea of the scope covered by the conference.

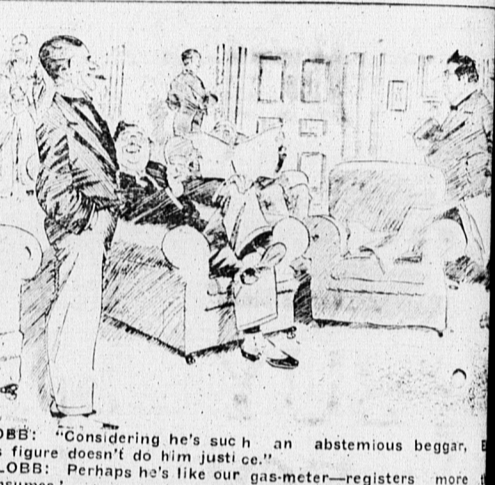
