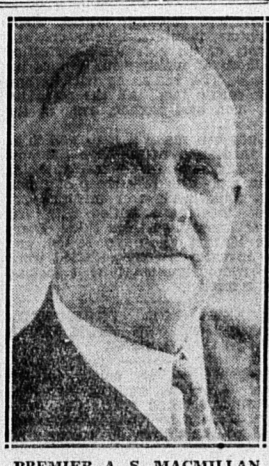
HEAVY FIGHTING RESUMED 55 MILES FROM MOSCOW

New Theatre Is On Rail Line To Soviet Capital

Other reports tell of Nazis digging in on some sections of Moscow front; Battles continue to rage in South.

MOSCOW, Oct. 29 (Wednesday) (AP)—Heavy fighting in the Volokolamsk sector, about 55 miles northwest of Moscow and about midway between the Kalinin and Mzhaisk sectors, was reported early today by the Soviet information bureau in a broadcast over the Moscow radio.

This new theatre of fighting before the Soviet capital is on a rail line that curves up from the city and continues on west toward the Latvian border.

The early morning communique said giant battles still raged in the Mzhaisk sector, 57 miles to the west, and in the vicinity of Maloyaroslavets, 65 miles southwest, with many Nazi thrusts beaten back.
