CHEAPER RAILWAY TRAVEL.

There seems to be little doubt in the minds of thoughtful persons that the reduction of passenger fares on railways would result in such a growth of business as would increase rather than diminish the receipts from this source. It was thus with letter postage in other countries and in Canada. We have now a large yearly surplus in the post office department under the two cent rate where there were always deficits under the five-cents or three-cents letter rate. Be that as it may, a vigorous agitation is going on throughout the United States, and to a less extent in Canada for a rate of two cents per mile for passengers.

Almost beyond question this is one of the reforms we may expect within the next few years. The electric railways, or trolley lines as they are called, have set the pace in these matters. At first these electric roads were confined to cities, then they began to extend to the country and soon they were linking together many towns and villages. Consolidation has followed, and now the electric lines have in many cases established a strong competition with the steam railways in passenger traffic, and they carry people at rates of two cents per mile or less, down to less than one cent per mile, and in such enormous numbers that they still make big profits.

The steam railways feel this competition keenly, and they are at the same time met by a popular demand for lower rates. Not a few of the States of great Republic have compelled the local railways to adopt a two cent rate, and now a Chicago despatch tells that two of the great transcontinental lines have adopted the same moderate rate. If so, the other great railways of the Republic will doubtless follow, and in due time the reform will spread to Canada. The question has been agitated in the Canadian Parliament from year to year, notably by Mr. McLean of North York, much to his credit, but the movement has so far been held in check by the wealthy railway corporations. The two-cent rate is coming, however, and cannot be much longer delayed.

OPIMUM PROHIBITION.

China is adopting prohibition against the opium traffic, its great national curse. Under the imperial edict recently promulgated no new ground may be planted with the poppy and the area now devoted to its cultivation must be diminished by one tenth each year until it ceases in ten years. The penalty for disobedience will be forfeiture of the land. All persons now addicted to the opium habit, if under 60 years of age, are demanded to curtail the use by twenty per cent yearly until they quit it altogether in five years. All opium dens must be closed within six months and all who sell pipes must cease within one year. All high officials must inform the Throne that they are willing to quit the use of opium within a stated time; all minor officials must quit within six months. If unable to do so they must retire from office. Those who falsely pretend to abandon opium will be deprived both of rank and office. Teachers, scholars, soldiers and sailors will be allowed three months in which to entirely abandon the narcotic poison. Magistrates are placed under heavy penalties if they fail to enforce the new law. This is prohibition on an unprecedented scale affecting the welfare of four hundred millions of people.

"Fourteen Tales" is the title of an engaging volume from the pen of John Pond, late editor of the *Summerside Pioneer* and now of London, England where the volume is published. The scenes of these short stories are laid in western North America, in both the United States and Canada. They show Mr. Pond to be possessed of keen dramatic instinct and to be an acute observer of nature, an ardent student of the wild life of the west, who tells a story in a manner that deeply engages the reader's attention and sympathy.

The closing exercises of the public schools in Market Hall yesterday afforded a happy occasion for teachers and pupils alike, evincing hearty public appreciation for the good work done and inspired new hopes for the future. It was a pretty picture withal to see so much blooming youth, vitality and happiness assembled together, a bright picture of what is the citizenship of a few years hence now in the making. All will join in the hope that in the weeks to come teachers and pupils alike may have the fullest enjoyment of their well-earned holidays.

It seems to be settled that there will be another session of Parliament before a general election and it is freely predicted that it will be another "scandal session." Should it so turn out it will be a matter to be deplored. For months during the late session the Parliamentary reports reeked with the unwholesome odor of social delinquencies, since prolonged by worse than useless litigation in the courts. The country is sick and tired of the whole business which is fast giving the Dominion an ill-flavored reputation at home and abroad.

There are a lot of mischievous urchins about the streets who need the rod of correction from parents, more home restraint, and just a little attention from the police. They throw stones at each other, or at groups of people, at horses and carriages and passing bicyclists. They delight to frighten horses, especially a team that may be left standing. We fear that newspaper warnings will not reform them. The police should make an example or two of the worst ones, and at the same time not forget the larger corner loafers who are again becoming obnoxious and obtrusive.



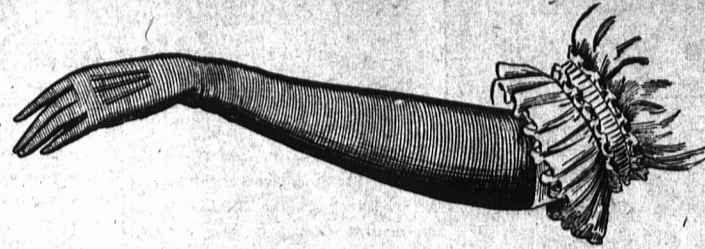

Synopsis of Canadian North-West

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, as defined in the Act, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.
Entry must be made, personally at the local office for the district in which the land is situated.
The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon a farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply.
