CHILDREN, LIKE PARENTS, LIVE UP TO REPUTATIONS

Generous Use Of Tact Rather Than Constant Carping Will Bring Desired Results In Child Discipline

It is a strange thing that mothers so seldom deign to use any diplomacy in dealing with their children. They know that it is soft soap that makes the machinery of the adult world go round, and that if they wish to be popular they must handle things with whom they come in contact with gloves. Also, they know that it isn't so much what they say that matters; it is how and when and where they say it. But with their children they use no such finesse. They don't waste any tactfulness on them. They go at Little Bobby and Suzy with hammer and tongs, without regard to the youngsters' sensibilities or whether their admonitions are likely to have a restraining moral influence or just raise the children's dander. And then they complain that they can't do a thing with their wayward sons and daughters. It never seems to occur to the parents that the reason they cannot control their children is because they go about it in the wrong way. They use force of persuasion, which is good for the long pull. They try to coerce their children into doing their way instead of selling them the idea that it is the best and most profitable way of doing things. They abuse instead of cajoling. In a word, they will not sugarcoat their pills and Bobby and Suzy refuse to swallow them.

Half of the time when children are disobedient it is because they have been arbitrarily ordered to do a thing instead of being courteously asked to do it; or forbidden to do something they want to do, without any sympathetic explanation made by the parents of why they are sorry to deny them any pleasure they crave.

When children are impertinent to their parents, it is often not just because they have never been treated with any politeness themselves. And when they do not admire their parents and respect them, it is invariably because the parents have not shown them any of the charm technique on Little Bobby and Suzy that they would have used to make themselves attractive to a stranger.

When to Use Flattery
Why parents do not see that children are almost morbidly susceptible to flattery and that you can work more reformation in them with a word of praise than they can with a perpetual lecture course passes comprehension. But it is true. You can correct Bobby's table manners a million times.

You can talk your tongue off telling him to stand up when a lady enters a room and he tumbles when he is spoken to and he will go on being the same uncouth little boy. But once let him overhear you speak of his beautiful manners and it will turn him into a Little Lord Chesterfield.

On the other hand, many a boy is developed into a gangster by his parents calling him names, berating his badness and prophesying that he will end up in jail. For children, like grown-ups, have an instinctive urge to live up to their blue china and be what people expect them to be.

Perhaps, however, the worst phase of it lack of tact parents show in dealing with their children is to be found in the way so many mothers treat their adolescent daughters. But only too often we have the mother whose heavy, blundering hand brings about the tragedy she dreads. Sometimes, when her daughter's safe she refuses to let her have dates at home, or to dance, or to indulge in any of the pleasures of youth, and the result is that the girl picks up boys on the streets and goes about with them God knows where.

Don't Be Tactless Mothers
Other mothers do not hesitate to show their daughters that they have no faith in their discretion or their morals. They accuse them of improprieties they have never thought of committing. They spy upon with boys and open their letters and eavesdrop their telephone conversations and makes them feel that if they are going to have the name of being bad they had as well have the game.

The tactless mother drives many a girl away from home. What a pity so many women never find out that youth can't be driven into being good and wise and prudent! It has to be lured into being so.

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THE COOK'S CORNER

FOUR-LAYER CAKE

Two cups sifted cake flour, 1 cup butter or other shortening, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, unbeaten, 1 cup milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup unsweetened chocolate, melted, 1-2 tablespoons sugar, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon butter, 1-4 teaspoon soda, 2 tablespoons boiling water.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream together well. Add egg and beat very thoroughly. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla, butter, soda, and water; stir until blended and thick. Cool slightly.

Turn a generous one-half of batter into greased 8-inch layer pan. Add chocolate mixture to remaining batter, stirring until thoroughly blended; turn into greased 8-inch layer pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 25 to 30 minutes, or until it is cool. Split layers in half to make four tiers. Spread rich custodian frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake, arranging light layers on dark layers.

Four tablespoons butter, 2-2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar, 1 egg, unbeaten, 1 tablespoon milk (about), dash of salt, 2-2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Cream butter; add 1 cup sugar and beat well. Add egg and beat. Add remaining sugar, alternately with milk, beating well. Add salt, chocolate, and vanilla, and beat until smooth.
