EARL OF BALFOUR'S BIRTHDAY HONORED BY BRITISH ACADEMY

The celebration of the Earl of Balfour's 80th birthday has created widespread interest in Great Britain. The British Academy, a learned society of which Lord Balfour has recently been given a permanent home at Burlington House. The funds for panelling and decorating these rooms were donated by an anonymous donor. The London Times, however, recently announced that Sir Charles Chubb Wakefield, Bart., on the specific request of the committee, admitted that the cost of reconstructing and adapting the premises was done at his expense. The Academy took formal possession of its new quarters and at the same time celebrated the 80th birthday of its President, Lord Balfour. The Prince of Wales was a guest of honour and proposed Lord Balfour's health.

GOLF BALLS MEET IN MID-AIR

(By British United Press) LONDON, August 21. A unique incident in golf took place recently on the Wentworth Falls course. Two members of the Leu Golf Club, Dr. Alcorn and E. A. Avery, were playing with the professional, E. Barnes. The tee shots of Avery, and Barnes at the 9 hole finished on opposite sides of the green. Unknown to each other, both players hit their second (clip shots) at the same time. Dr. Alcorn, standing at the pin, suddenly saw two balls approaching the hole from different angles. The balls met over the hole and dropped in.

The only known instance of two balls being played at the same time and meeting in mid-air occurred at St. Andrews in May 1926 when Colonel Howard and Lieut. Col. Buchanan Dunlop played to the 16 green and the balls, going towards the same hole, met 20 yards from the pin.

Seaside Costumes of 71 Years Ago

(By British United Press) LONDON, August 21.—A striking picture of the contrast between beach fashions of 74 years ago and the of to-day is drawn by a West end buyer in drapery trade. He describes in "Men's Wear" the fashions on Ramsgate sands as shown by Firth, the artist, in 1854. Men sat on the sands in tall silk hats; frock coats, double-breasted waist coats with enormous lapels, tight trousers and patent leather spring-sided boots. Large Gladstonian collars were worn in many cases with frilled shirts fronts and tremendous stock bows. Every man carried a knob-headed stick with either a silk or leather tassel. Little boys and girls who now run about with practically nothing on have a much easier time than their grandfathers. Grandpa (aged 7) had frills to his knicker, and wore a silk hat or a wide-brimmed black straw sailor's hat when he was digging in the sand, and grandma was all muffled up in frocks and frills. The girl of 1854 wore enormous crinolines, tiny shawls over their shoulders and huge feathered hats or a poke bonnet. Every woman carried a tiny parasol. The girls bathing costumes were "fearful creations," mostly navy blue, with legs down to the ankles tied with tapes, and sleeves tied at the wrists all fluffy and frilly, and a kind of collar similar to what Dog Toby wears in Punch and Judy.
