The Show the Best For Many Years.

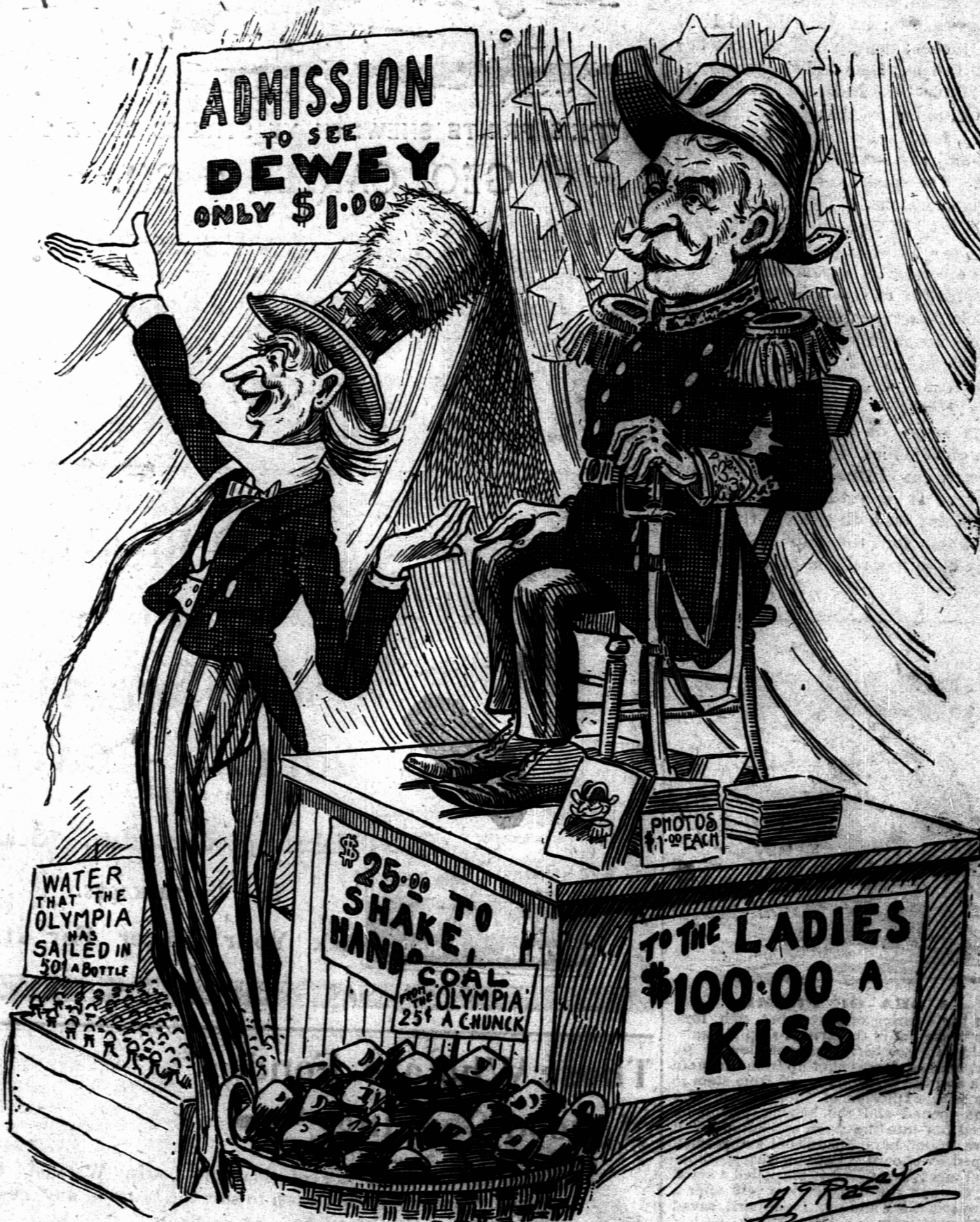
SEVERE EARTHQUAKE
