WITH THE R. C. A. F. OVERSEAS, May 29 - (CP) - While Canada's airmen in Europe were making the headlines in the closing stages of the war there hundreds of R.C.A.F. boys were still plugging away in the less-publicized front-line campaign. Many Canadians flew in R.A.F. Liberators on the amphibious assault on Bangalore, Sdn. Ldr. J. M. Stroud of Hamilton, Ont., led one flight in the first attack. They flew through heavy premonsoon rainstorms to reach the target and were forced to bomb from beneath low clouds. Stroud's crew included FO, A. D. Skirrow of Stawfield, Ala., and FO, Wilson Duff of Vancouver, B.C. FO, Howard Hughes of North Bay and Fort Erie, Ont., who was on the same show, moaned about lack of opposition. "There wasn't so much as an old lady with a shotgun," he complained. With him were FO, Ed Rawson of North Knappton, B.C., and FO, Walter Thornburn of Winnipeg. Canadians placed first and second in the major event at a meet of the Ski Club of India, held in Kashmir's snow-blanketed Himalayas mountains. Fit - Lt. George Geary of (88 Boswell Ave-

ny) Toronto, and Charlottetown. F. E. I., former navigator in a supply-dropping squadron, won the open downhill race handily. In second place was Fit-Lt. Paul Gingras of (67 Mountain Avenue) Quebec City, who is with R.C.A.F. District Headquarters, Bombay. One of the sights of the meet was Geary's bushy black beard. When an R. A. F. Liberator piloted by Sqn. Ldr. Johnny Gauntlett, D.F.C., formerly of Regina, bombed a bridge on the Burma-Stam railway a Jap shell hit a box of navigation flame-floats and set them afire. Blazing liquid splashed in all directions. WO, J. W. de Salvo of Simco, Ont., the flight engineer, with the English wireless operator, put the fire out after a tough fight. With petrol leaking from a fuel tank after another ack-ack hit Gauntlett and his boys had an anxious 5 1/2 hour trip back to base. In the crew were FO, S. M. Standhoff of (356 Atkins St.) Winnipeg; FO, L. T. Simmons of (91 Horace St.) Norwood, Winnipeg; Sgt. R. E. Parks of (Vimy Barracks) Kingston, Ont., and Sgt. E. J. Jarnum of Mount Brydges, Ont. Crews of an R. C. A. F. Dakota Squadron which has been operating over Burma since last December are getting plenty of experience in monsoon flying. On one

day seven aircraft were diverted from base as dusk brought rain squalls, low visibility, high winds and bumpy flying. PO, George Oresto of (Roslyn Ave.) Toronto, captured one aircraft that got back to an airfield without incident. "The only excitement we had was finding a giant spider in the kite when we woke up in the morning," he said. "It was big enough to put a saddle on."

KEEP SOFT LUSTRE ON PRIZED PEWTER

To keep that prized pewter teapot or decorative piece looking its best, remember its a soft lustre you want - not a bright, shiny finish. First, wash in hot water and soap; rinse carefully, making sure no soap is left in crevices. Second, dry each piece with a soft cloth thoroughly to prevent pitting. If your pewter teapot, vase or tray has a light tarnish, it can be quickly removed with a good silver polish. Do not use harsh cleaners as they are likely to injure the surface of this soft metal. To remove a heavy tarnish, first apply silver polish, scrubbing on well with a soft brush. Then, while polish is still wet, apply a lather of soap.
