The learned speaker spoke of the care which should be exercised in the various stages of child life. From birth until the seventh year the mother is the presiding genius and the father the ruling spirit. It is during this period that the fundamentals of character are formed. Between the age of 7 and 14 the value of being taught how to play properly cannot be over estimated, as it is during this period that education is advanced, and proper supervised play is the greatest educator. From 14 to 21 is probably the most important period of child life. It is during this time that ideals, willpower, the thoughts of a career are uppermost in the mind and parents should endeavor to aid in the development of all of these things according to their own choice under careful direction. The speaker was very heartily thanked by Chairman Ray Pendleton on behalf of the club. It was fitting that the school boys who brought such honor to our city through their performance at the Inter-Scholastic sports held recently at Moncton, were present today. Percy Turner, who accompanied the boys to Moncton introduced Arthur Gormley, Eddie Horaby, Loyola Duffy all of Queen Square School and Ted Holl, who is the all round school boy champion of the Maritime Provinces, Tim Ranaahan and Don Finlayson, all of West Kent School. We hope that every friend of the Institution will get a copy of this report, we are endeavoring to place quantities in different centres as well as supplying all our Auxiliaries and as many Institutes and individuals as would like them. A line to the Secretary brings one. The Adjourned Annual Meeting was held on July 6th and it is felt that it was a real success; the work was all carefully reviewed and explained and a host of all many, very many misconceptions were cleared away. The Auxiliary Delegates met in the City the same date; we hope their visit was enjoyable and productive; the drive to the Home and the seeing of the children must start something.
