—DEATH OF FORMER ISLANDER, Prof. John Reilly, for more than 36 years a member of Iowa University Mathematics Department, died at his home in Iowa on Tuesday Aug. 23 following an illness of approximately one year. He was 67 years old. John Frank Reilly was born in Summerside, P. E. I., in 1875. He was the son of William and Janet Molison Reilly. He received his diploma from the Prince of Wales College normal school and later received his B. A. degree from Dalhousie University. After obtaining the A. M. degree at Harvard in 1906 he went to the University of Iowa and received his Ph. D. degree in 1921. He has been active for a decade and a half in municipal affairs in Iowa, was government weather observer there for 9 years and served two terms on the city council. Professor Reilly was noted as an educator in the field of actuarial science and was co-author of "Plane and Spherical Trigonometry." He joined the faculty of Iowa in 1908 and had taught in the mathematical department until the time of his death. He was a member of the City Chapter No. 2 of the Masonic Lodge and was past master of the Iowa City Lodge No. 4 A. F. and A. M. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church. He is survived by his wife formerly Miss Isabel Hutchison, five sons five sisters and four brothers. S

Use Of Board's Name Illegal If Unauthorized

OTTAWA, Sept. 11—(CP)—The Wartime Prices and Trade Board moved today to prevent unauthorized use of its name by business concerns professedly making transactions "with the approval" of the Board. Without stating whether any Canadian firms have been guilty of so using its name, the board issued an order making such action illegal. In addition, the order restricted references in advertisements or other printed matter to any licensee of the board, which now may be mentioned only as "Wartime Prices and Trade Board licence no. —".

Says Authors Write Less Drama

MONTREAL, Sept. 11—(CP)—Rupert Lucas of Ottawa, supervising director of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, today told delegates to the 21st annual convention of the Canadian Authors' Association that drama submissions to the CBC have dropped 50 per cent since last May. The decrease, Mr. Lucas said, may be due to the fact that authors are busy with war work, that is for stories.
