The Prince Edward Island Cheese Board, which has held its meetings in the F. B. McLea Rooms in this City, has had a very successful year during which nine meetings were held. The officers were chosen at the first meeting held on the 25th June, as follows: President Hughlin McDonald, East Point; Vice-President, Chas. Wayne, St. Peter's; Secretary-Treasurer and salesman, Robert Jenkins, Mt. Allison, all re-elected. The total number of cheese boarded was 12885; the number sold on the board was 911. The average price paid on the board was 11.75; the highest price was 12 and 13-16; and the lowest price was 10 and 13-16. The following comparative statement will be interesting: In 1899 cheese sold for 9.95; in 1900 for 10.25; in 1901 for 9.25; in 1902 for 10.15; in 1903 for 10.40; in 1904 for 8; in 1905 for 10.70; in 1906 for 12.15; in 1907 for 11.75 cents per pound. Last year twenty factories contributed the sum of \$57 in membership fees and there was a balance on hand of \$28.17, making a total of \$85.17 which was balanced by the expense of the year. Eighteen factories manufacturing cheese have not yet contributed for the support of the Board. If these would pay in there would be a good balance to credit. Factories contributing will be credited, and it is not too late yet to do so.

A special excursion train will leave this city tomorrow, New Year's Day, at 8.20 a. m. for Murray Harbor. Full particulars are given in the ad in this issue.

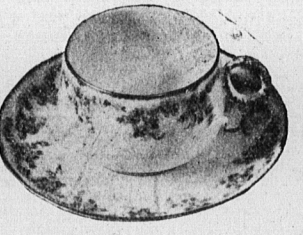
