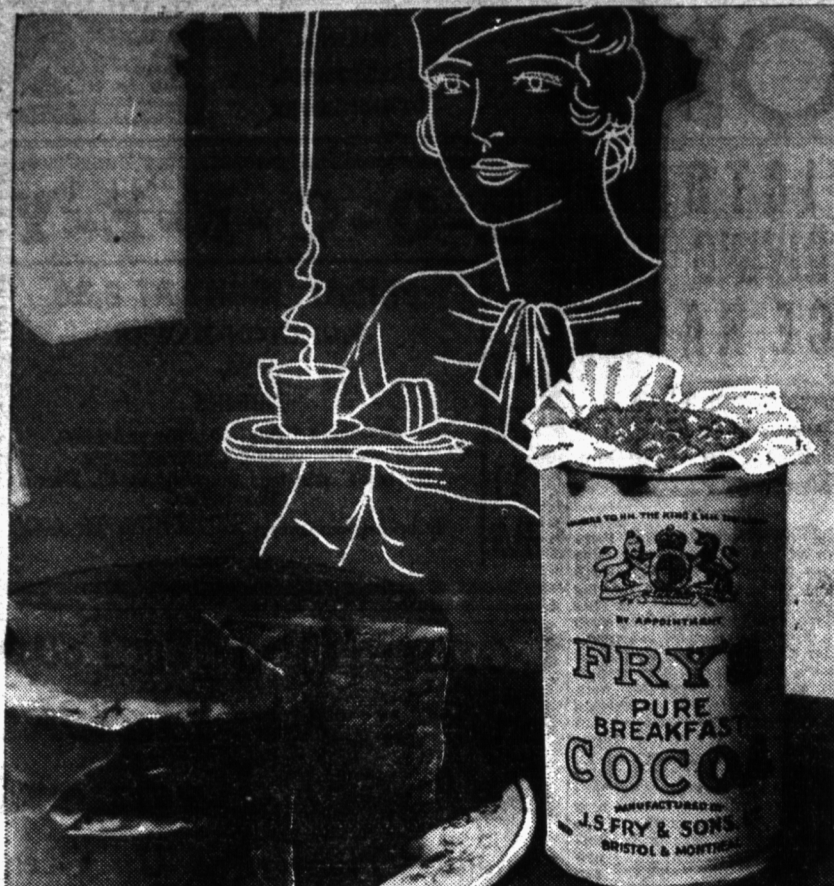

ANOTHER OLD TIMER FINDS SAFE HARBOR

Captain William Chapman Dead at Saint John After Adventurous Career in Sailing Ships

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 30.—(C. P.): Another link with the old days of New Brunswick's wooden ships snapped when Captain William Chapman, 78, died at his home here.

"But the past is to the past," Captain Chapman remarked in the last interview he gave concerning his adventurous career. "Our day is done. The spirit of the great wooden ships has fled, fled with the old tide, only, unlike the tide, it will never return."

Although he had commanded both sailing vessels and steamers, Captain Chapman often deprecated the latter, terming them "steam kettles" and "not for real sailors" although "fast and seaworthy."

Volunteering to take a vessel to South Africa and back during the Great War, the veteran mariner made a famous voyage by safely traversing the dreaded mine zones.

Born at St. Martins, N. B., he became known familiarly as "Captain Bomby Doonee," the nickname arising when he commanded a vessel of that name built by his father.

Soon after boarding the schooner Alexander MacKenzie, however, he had experience with this type of sailor. The crew became drunk off Yarmouth and a storm blew up.

HIGH HEELS SAFE IF SHOE WELL FITTED

TORONTO, Jan. 31.—(C.P.)—The old belief that women cannot wear high heels without ruining their feet, surveys made by Mr. Brewer in his home state have revealed.

"Certainly women may wear high heels, but, of course, only if their shoes are properly fitted," he said. "Apparently, was the catch for Mr. Brewer explained, any shoe that did not properly support the foot by curves on the inner sole should not be worn."

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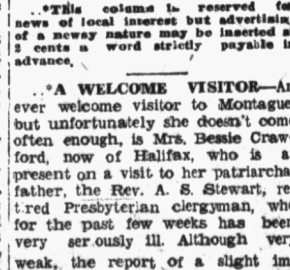
