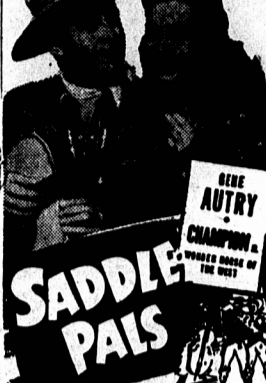

Says Canadian Electrical Goods Industry Endangered

(By The Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Feb. 4 - Charging Canada's electrical manufacturing industry faces destruction, the United Electrical Workers (C.E.W.) today demanded that the Government free it from United States "domination" and from "disastrous effects" of the new dollar-conservation policy.

A 20,000-word brief from the U.E.W. was made public by Canadian president C. S. Jackson of Toronto, who declared it had been sent to the Cabinet and Commons members after Trade Minister Howe had declined to grant an interview to representatives of the 25,000-member Canadian section of the U.E.W.

Mr. Jackson said it was "difficult to understand" Mr. Howe's attitude, in view of the fact it was largely on his judgment the "Abbott Plan" would operate. The U.E.W. members were being "denied a voice in the formulation of Government policies that can drastically affect their future."

Mr. Howe declined to comment on the Jackson charge that he had declined an interview. He said the brief had been presented to him by Pat Conroy, secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Congress of Labor, and it was under consideration.

Declaring American domination and the dollar-conservation program threatened the Canadian industry, the U.E.W. brief called on the Government to take these steps immediately:

- 1. Repeal the new excise tax on certain durable consumer goods made in Canada. This would help maintain the domestic market and encourage Canadian manufacture to take the place of banned imports from the U.S.
2. Roll back prices to 1946 levels and impose ceilings there.
3. Impose a 100-per-cent tax on excess profits.
4. Promote export trade with, and grant credits to, countries wanting to buy Canadian goods to restore or expand their industries, regardless of their ability to pay in U.S. dollars and "without attaching political conditions."
5. Ban the transfer from Canada of dividends and royalty payments to the U.S.
6. Control the import of parts, supplies, materials and capital equipment from the U.S. "in such a way that Canadian industry will be developed rather than disrupted."
