**1ST AMERICAN CONTINGENT ATTACKED BY GERMAN SUBS**

WASHINGTON.—The story of the submarine attacks on transports conveying the United States first expeditionary forces to France, is described today in the official report of Rear Admiral Gleaves commanding the naval convoy, made public by Secretary of Navy Daniels.

At least two undersea raiders are indicated to have taken part in the first attack, which was centered on the flagship of Admiral Gleaves. The second group of transports also encountered two submarines, one of which apparently was destroyed by bombs from an American destroyer.

Regarding the third group of vessels, there is some difference of opinion among officers of the convoy as to whether there was an attack.

**SUBMARINE TOLL OF ALLIED SHIPPING FOR PAST WEEK**

LONDON.—The following is the British official weekly shipping summary given out yesterday:

Arrivals, 2,747, sailings, 2,776.

British merchantmen of more than 1,600 tons sunk, 18; under 1,600 tons three.

British merchantmen unsuccessfully attacked, nine, including three previously. Fishing vessels sunk, none.

**Franco-Italian Losses**

PARIS.—Two French ships of more than 1,600 tons and one vessel of under 1,600 tons were sunk by mine or submarine last week, according to the weekly shipping summary given out by the French Admiralty last night. Three ships were unsuccessfully attacked. During the week 1,908 ships entered French ports while 1,072 sailed.

Rome.—Italian vessels lost as a result of submarines last week numbered four sailing ships, according to an official statement. This statement reads: "During the week ending midnight July 29th, 610 ships with a gross tonnage of 413,000 entered Italian ports. Five hundred and thirty-six with a tonnage of 401,000 departed. The losses comprised more than 4,500 tons. One steamer was attacked and damaged, but escaped."



**U.S. WILL ONLY TALK PEACE WITH BEATEN GERMANY**

WASHINGTON.—The United States will talk specific terms of peace only when Germany is beaten. This is the decision of the Government as the Allied democracies enter upon the fourth year of the world struggle.

Behind it are found the reasons for America's refusal to support now the retention by France of Alsace-Lorraine as a peace proviso. It further reveals that the United States is committed to press through to the finish, side by side with her allies. And it may be stated with authority that there is an understanding among all these nations—America included—that there will be no separate peace.

The Government today is concerned only with victory.

The Government refuses to state even what terms it has in mind—if any—though the belief is that the Allies now have a common understanding with this country as to how far the war should proceed and what victory comes.

**BRITISH GOVERNMENT WANTS POWER TO ISSUE A LOAN**

LONDON.—Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, told the House of Commons today that he did not contemplate issuing a loan during the adjournment to pass a bill giving the government the power to issue a loan if it were considered advisable.

Such a bill also was required, he said, because the government would have to give the American government long dated notes in exchange for a loan received from them and the treasury's power to issue such notes was limited by the last bill and is not sufficient to carry us through the recess.

**MASKED MEN HANG A LABOR AGITATOR**

BUTE, Mont.—Frank Little, member of the executive board of the Industrial Workers of the World, and leader in labor troubles in Arizona, was taken from a lodging house early today by masked men and hanged to a railroad trestle on the outskirts of the city.

The body was cut down at 8 a.m. by the chief of police Jerry Murphy, who identified it. Little, in a recent speech here referred to the United States troops as "Uncle Sam's scabs in uniform."

**RUSSIAN RIFF-RAFF IN FIT OF COWARDICE IS IN FLIGHT**

PETROGRAD.—The provisional committee of the Duma has made public an appeal to the people, in which it says:

"The riff-raft of the army overwhelmed by a fit of cowardice is in flight. What has occurred in the army is merely an echo of what is happening all over Russia. This state of affairs is due to the usurpation of the rights and power of the government by organizations of irresponsible parties and to the setting up of a double authority at the centre while there is no authority at all on the spot."

**INTERNECINE STRIFE IN RUSSIA**

TIFIS, RUSSIA.—Deserters from the army who are being rounded up by the military authorities, opened fire on them, wounding several soldiers. Reinforcements of Cossacks armed with machine guns arrived and fired on the deserters, wounding many more. Four hundred of the deserters surrendered.


