Dominion Life Business Shows Substantial Increase For 1938

ANOTHER YEAR OF OUTSTANDING SUCCESS.

The annual statement of the Dominion Life Assurance Company, released today, indicates that the Company has enjoyed gratifying progress for the year 1938. The report covering the Company's operations in its 50th year reveals an increase in assets of over \$4,073,400, making a total in excess of \$40,883,057.

Mr. Ford S. Kumpe, President and Managing Director of the Company, drew attention to the fact that payments to policyholders and beneficiaries during 1938 totalled \$3,132,606 and that over \$40,800,000 has been paid to policyholders and beneficiaries in the 50 years of the Company's history.
