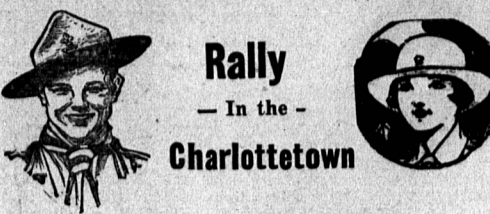

GREETINGS CONVEYED FROM MASS.

'We are here on a goodwill trip to bring greetings from the residents of Massachusetts to their kin in the Maritimes.'

'The Maritime people have been a very important factor in the up-building of our state.'

'They arrived at nine o'clock yesterday morning from Sydney exclaiming over the beauty of Island scenery from the air.'

'There is such an evidence of fertility,' declared Auditor Baker.

Strawberry Growers Discuss Marketing

A meeting of the Queen's County Strawberry Growers Association was held in the Department of Agriculture Office last evening. It was attended by several of the retail grocers also. The president of the Association, Mr. George Dewar, presided. Problems in connection with the marketing of the strawberries were discussed, with the object of improving the quality of the berries and thus increasing the demand. The question of advertising was also discussed.

The growers decided to grade their fruit according to the regulations laid down in the Fruit and Honey Act. The act requires that the berries shall have the calyx attached, be well formed, of good colour, firm but not overripe, free from surface moisture, bruises, bird pecks, mould and from damage caused by sand, disease or other means. The minimum diameter shall be 5-8 inch. Mr. Ira Douglas, Inspector under the Fruit and Honey Act, is going to give advisory inspection so that growers who are not aware of what the act calls for may be informed.

BIBLE SOCIETY HELD MEETING AT CARDIGAN

The ninety-sixth annual meeting of the P. E. I. Auxiliary of the B. and F. Bible Society in Canada was held in the Cardigan Presbyterian Church yesterday. The weather was perfect and the Church grounds was an ideal spot for the delegates as they gathered in groups between the sessions for friendly intercourse and discussions.

The executive met at 11.00 a.m. with the President, Rev. H. D. Raymond, in the chair. There was a fair representation of ministers and laymen present. Rev. George Ayers of Hampton gave the opening prayer. In the absence of Mr. J. P. Gordon who was unable to be present until the afternoon meeting, Mrs. Frances Holl Traitor and Mr. John F. Wear were appointed secretaries pro tem. All delegates present who were not members of the executive were invited to take seats at the meeting.

After reading of the minutes by Mr. Wear, Dr. H. D. Johnson, the Treasurer, presented his report explaining many of the details. The report is contained in the printed annual report of the auxiliary which was then distributed and shows gross receipts for 1934 of \$6,237.88, besides \$161.48 received after the books were closed. The sum of \$5,425 has been contributed to the B. and F. Bible Society in Canada and there is still \$420 to credit in the bank after the payment of all bills. The report was adopted.

On motion of Rev. D. L. Griffiths, Belfast, it was decided that in future a copy of the printed annual report be sent to all members and to all branch officers previous to the annual meeting.

The question of increasing sales through the depository, and increasing the distribution of the Bible throughout the Province was considered, whereupon Rev. Dr. Vincent moved, seconded by Mr. J. A. Thompson of Kensington, that the matter be referred to the incoming executive for action if found necessary. The motion carried.

Mr. Robert Docherty announced that arrangements had been made for the entertainment of the delegates and after some remarks by the chairman the meeting adjourned.

Afternoon Session The afternoon meeting convened at 2:30 with Rev. H. D. Raymond in the chair. He announced that owing to the absence of the Province of Lord Baden-Powell and Lady Baden-Powell, Lieutenant Governor G. D. DeBlois was unable to be present and preside at the meeting as intended. This announcement was heard with regret. Rev. T. Owen Hughes, Cardigan was then called upon to conduct devotional exercises, after which Mr. J. P. Gordon read the minutes of last annual meeting which were adopted.

The chairman in most appropriate words spoke of the delightful reports of the mission, the surroundings and the hospitality of the people of Cardigan. He referred to the work of the B. & F. Bible Society which distributed 11,000,000 copies of the scriptures either in whole or in part last year. The Bible is now translated into 699 languages and dialects. Fourteen new translations took place last year and 240 have been made in the course of King George's reign.

Mr. Gordon as Secretary and Dr. Johnson as Treasurer each gave additional reports. More branches reported the year and there was an increase of \$975 in receipts.

Rev. J. M. Murchison gave his report as district secretary covering the work done not only in this Province but also in New Brunswick where two Colporteurs are employed and a Bible House is established in Saint John from which distribution of the Scriptures is made.

During the discussion period the question of extension of depository service was again introduced by Rev. Allister Murray of Caledonia, who was followed by Rev. Geo. Ayers and Mr. Wear and the chairman, whereupon Rev. Mr. Murray moved, seconded by Mr. W. V. Purdie, that it be recommended to the executive that depositories be established in as many places as possible. The motion carried.

Rev. Dr. H. L. Orchard of Amherst, N. S., who was guest speaker for the meeting, then was called upon and gave an intensely interesting address in which he gave an historical sketch of the life of Venerable Bede, who made the first translation of Saint John's Gospel in the Anglo-Saxon language in 735 A.D. His death took place on Ascension Day of that year and we are now commemorating the 1200th anniversary of his death and in doing so every Christian should read again this year the Gospel of St. John. Dr. Orchard gave a delightful and touching account of the Apostle and of his wonderful gospel. He closed by saying how the great work of the Bible Society was made possible by the individual effort and the small auxiliaries all over the world.
