LAI'D TO REST—The funeral of the late Mary Wise who passed away in the Sacred Heart Home on Sunday was held yesterday morning from A. A. Hennessey's Funeral Home to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, where a Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father McCarthy. Service at the grave was conducted by Rev. P. Walsh.

When the court opened yesterday morning His Lordship Chief Justice Matheson refused the motion made by Mr. Johnston the previous day asking that the court direct the jury to bring in a verdict of acquittal for the prisoners, George Galbraith and Arthur Smith. Mr. Johnston then informed the court that there would be no evidence tendered for the defense. The addresses of the counsel to the jury then followed. Mr. McCallum speaking on behalf of the prisoner Smith, Mr. Johnston on behalf of the prisoner Galbraith and Mr. Campbell for the Crown. After his Lordship had delivered his charge the jury retired at 12:10 p. m. and returned at 2:30 with the report that they could not agree upon a verdict. The case of the King vs. John Winchester charged with receiving stolen goods, was then taken up. Mr. T. A. Campbell acting for the Crown, Mr. J. J. Johnston, K. C. and Mr. C. D. McCallum for the prisoner. After examination of Mr. Daniel Rayner, the first witness, the court adjourned till 10:30 this morning.

COMPLIMENTARY WRITE-UP—The Beaver Canada First, a weekly newspaper published in Toronto, in its issue of Nov. 29th gives a complimentary write-up of Mr. J. E. B. MacCreedy, in which reference is made to his long journalistic career and his association with the first Canadian Parliament under Confederation. His popularity as a citizen is noted and emphasis is laid upon the fact that in his eightieth year Mr. MacCreedy is still engaged in active journalism and is probably the oldest journalist in Canada. The article also gives an excellent photograph of Mr. MacCreedy.

HOME FOR BURIAL—The remains of J. R. McNeill was forwarded yesterday morning to Antigonish from the Funeral Home of A. A. Hennessey. The body was accompanied by his wife and sister-in-law. The deceased who was a retired member of the New York Police Department in which he served for twenty-five years, retiring about three years ago, has been living in the city for the past three months in the hope that this climate would restore his health.

THE POST OFFICE AND CHRISTMAS CARDS

The Post Office Department is renewing its campaign against the use of small and irregular sized greeting cards and envelopes, which are objected to for a number of reasons, among them the following:

Such small-sized cards and envelopes frequently cannot be run through the cancelling machines, thus necessitating cancelling the stamps by hand and other extra handlings in the course of their facing, distribution, etc.; the addresses are likely to be obliterated by the cancelling mark; they do not fit the separating cases in use throughout the postal service, and cannot be tied securely with letter packages; furthermore, there is not sufficient space for directions for forwarding, etc.

In general the Post Office recommends that no cards or envelopes smaller than 3" x 4" be used and at the same time the overlarge ones should also be avoided as these too are difficult to handle and therefore subject to delay.

DEATH CAUSES SENATE CHANGE

OTTAWA, Dec. 4.—The Conservative majority in the Senate has dwindled to four by the death of Senator Webster, Conservative. There are now 50 Conservatives in the Senate and 40 Liberals and one Progressive, with five vacancies. The vacancies will be filled by Liberals making the government strength in the Senate 46 and the Conservative 50.

Before the five vacancies are filled it is possible that a decision may have been made by the privy council in the forthcoming reference as to the eligibility of women to enter the Senate. The leave to appeal has been granted and the appeal will be taken some time next year.

Although the appeal is fathered—rather mothered by four western senators, the government will take the view that it is a national question and will provide the costs of the appeal. If the decision is in favor of women entering the Senate it is considered possible that Mrs. Cloran, wife of the late Senator Cloran, may be the first woman senator. Mrs. Cloran was formerly president of the Ottawa Liberal Association and has taken an active part in federal politics.

IRISH CASTLE HAS BANISHMENT

Gormanston Castle, in Ireland, has a banishment or supernatural being who is supposed to warn the family of an approaching death, according to recent reports. This particular banishment is said to emerge in vapory white draperies crying piteously over the house. Another story told is that a band of foxes appears whenever misfortune is about to befall the family. Viscount Gormanston, premier viscount of Ireland recently celebrated his fourteenth birthday and has paid little heed to the stories of the banishment.

WELL KNOWN HERE—Alonso W. Perry, well known in Halifax and Prince Edward Island some years ago as a former steamship operator, succeeding the Plant Line steamers between Boston, Halifax and Charlottetown, died in Boston a few days ago and left an estate which totals more than \$10,000,000. One of the well-known steamers of the line, the A. W. Perry, was named after him. At that time, Mr. R. H. Humphrey, now assessor in the federal income tax department at Halifax, looked after the business of the Plant Line boats at this end.

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE CAMPAIGN—It is very satisfactory to report that the personal solicitation of Charlottetown citizens in the Christmas Seal Sale Campaign, which the members of the Gyro Club have been carrying out with such commendable energy, has yielded considerably better results than were realized in last year's canvass. From persons to whom seals have been sent by post, however, the returns are coming in a little more slowly than the promoters would desire. But some very encouraging letters have been received. One writes: "Enclosed find postal note for \$1 for Christmas Seals. Every man and most women should buy a dollar's worth, and they would never miss the dollar." Another, remarking the dollar, says "I am always glad to help along the Red Cross." Another enclosing payment adds "I wish you abundant success in the good work." Yet another writes, "Please accept my best wishes for the P. E. I. Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society and members. I hope they will have success with the sale of seals, which will be a help to wipe out this dread disease tuberculosis." An especially gratifying reply is this: "I am sending the money for the seals. Please send me another dollar's worth."

The Markets

EGGS

OTTAWA, Dec. 4.—The mild weather of the past few days has not been conducive to active trading in eggs and the market is quiet as a result.

Toronto: The local egg market is unchanged, but the undercurrent is slightly weaker. Two cars of B. C. eggs are here at the present time. Manitoba turkeys are offering at 43 cents for specials, 41 cents for "A" grade and 38 cents for "B" grade of all weights. The freight from Manitoba is approximately 21-2 cents.

Montreal: Weather conditions here are against sales of storage eggs. The fresh market is also declining. A car of B. C. eggs at present rolling has been sold at extras 32 cents; firsts 46 cents; pullet extras 42 cents. F. O. B. Montreal.

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 4.—Extreme dullness marked the export trade in Canadian grain here today, there being little or no demand from foreign buyers. The trade in cash grain in the domestic market was also rather quiet, the demand being only for odd cars, but prices were firm. The inquiry for spring and winter wheat flour was fair and values were steady. The undertone to the milled market was firm under a good demand. Rolled oats were unchanged. The egg trade continued active and prices for all grades of fresh and storage were firmly maintained. Receipts were 625 cases. A moderate amount of business was done in potatoes and values were unchanged. Prince Edward Island cobbler sold at 70 cents and Green mountains at 82 cents per 90 lb. bag. The bean market was steady and firm Canadian beans sold at \$5.25 per bushel while in a jobbing way they were offered at 59-1-2 cents per lb. yellow at 61-2 cents and yellow eyes at 9 cents per lb. A feature of the butter trade was the increased inquiry from all sources and a fair amount of business was done at steady prices. Receipts were 186 packages. The local and foreign demand for cheese continued of a limited character and the undertone to the market was easier. Receipts were 1,275 boxes.
