Died of Wounds in France

PTE. JAMES MAURICE MAHAR

Mr. and Mrs. Leo Mahar, 303 Filzroy Street, received word on September 20th from Ottawa, that their son Maurice had been wounded in action in France. And on September 23rd they received the sad and heart-breaking news that he died of wounds on September 16th.

Maurice was a general favorite of the family, his numerous friends will learn with deep regret of his sudden death. Of a jolly and pleasant disposition he endeared himself to all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance.

He was of excellent character and his sudden passing at such an early age is deeply regretted by his heart-broken parents, brothers and sisters.

A graduate of Queen Square School he was 22 years of age. He enlisted with the Artillery, but just before going overseas he was transferred to the Infantry. He had only been overseas four weeks until he received three days after getting word of his death. To add to their terrible grief a letter was received three days after getting word of his death. It was mailed on September 11th, the day after he passed away. It was evidently in his personal belongings when he died.

There are left to mourn besides his sorrowing parents four brothers who all enlisted at the outbreak of the war. Fred and Ivan with the R. C. N. V. R. Daniel with the P. E. I. Highlanders, P. O. Willie, and the R. C. N. V. R. also two brothers, Maurice Costello, Charlottetown, and Mrs. Donald Anderson, St. John, N. B.

WAR GASES

War gases are any chemical substances, solids, liquids, or gases, used in war for their poisonous or irritant effects on the human body. They may be classified according to these effects, as follows:

Lung Irritants (Choking Gases)
These irritate the throat and the lungs and cause coughing and difficult breathing. Exposure to a strong concentration, even for a brief period, may be fatal.

Eye Irritants (Tear Gases)
These cause intense smarting of the eyes and a copious flow of tears but do not cause permanent damage.

Nose Irritants (Sneezing Gases)
These cause extreme pain in the nose, throat, and chest and they generally produce nausea and mental depression. Though the effects are not permanent, they are rather persistent.

Skin Irritants (Blister Gases)
These affect all parts of the body and they penetrate porous substances including ordinary clothing, even heavy leather boots. The eyes, lungs, and skin are all affected by these in either the gas or liquid form, and deep and extensive blistering may result. These gases are doubly dangerous because they cause no immediate discomfort.

Cost of Hog Production Increases with Age

(Continued from page 2)

by a special pig scale which is well suited to the job of weighing pigs on the farm has been determined under the auspices of the Production Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and is being offered at cost to farmers. Information on this scale can be obtained from District Fieldmen of the Production Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture, or the Superintendent of the nearest Dominion Experimental Farm.

Hogs weighing not more than 210 pounds alive when marketed at about six months old are not only more likely to receive the premium on a grade but they will also cost considerably less to produce than will hogs marketed at heavier weights and after several weeks older.

Information on the Dominion Experimental Station, Lacombe, Alta., has shown a progressively increasing utilization with increasing weight. Information on growth and feeding recorded on 109 hogs, showed that produce one hundred pounds of gain for the first thirty days of the experiment, 375 pounds for the second thirty days, 427 pounds for the third thirty days and 422 pounds for the final thirty-eight days. The average requirement for the total period being 322 pounds of grain for 100 lb. of gain.

The cheaper gains made by young hogs are attributed to the fact that gains at heavy weights are mostly made up of fat, and not of lean meat.

With the cost of gains steadily increasing with the age of the pig, it is evident that the most profitable hogs will be those marketed at 180 and 210 pounds in weight.

Exports to United States

Exports of dairy cattle to the United States amounted to 70 head this week, as compared with 74 in the same week last year. To date the total exports for 1944 are 30,969, as compared with 29,000 in 1943 and last year for the same period they were 36,955 head. Sheep and lamb exports during the week were approximately 17,700, as compared with 17,000 in 1943 and last year for the same period the lifting of the export permit restrictions is now 78,837.

Calves in Good Demand

No change was shown in the market where demand continued good. Toronto paid \$14.15 for best (Montreal) \$13.30 to \$14.00, Winnipeg \$11.00 to \$12.00, Calgary \$9.00 to \$9.50, Edmonton \$8.00 to \$11.00, Prince Albert up to \$10.00, Moose Jaw \$8.25, Regina \$11.00, Saskatoon \$11.00.

Toronto Hogs Lower

A drop of 20 cents occurred in the Toronto hog market; Grade B1 hogs finished at \$17.00. Elsewhere the market continued steady. Montreal sold B1 hogs at \$17.25, Winnipeg \$16.40 to \$16.50, Calgary and Edmonton \$16.80, Prince Albert, Moose Jaw and Regina \$16.10, Saskatoon \$16.00 to \$16.10, Vancouver \$16.85 and Moncton \$17.25.

The above prices do not include the Dominion Government premiums of \$3.00 per head on Grade B1 hogs and \$2.00 per head on Grade B2.

Some Lambs Tending Easier

There was a little easier feeling in the lamb trade at \$12.50 to \$13.00 for good lambs, and Montreal was steady at \$11.50, Edmonton \$9.75 to \$10.50, Prince Albert \$9.25, Moose Jaw \$9.25 to \$9.75, Regina \$10.00, Saskatoon up to \$9.25, and Vancouver \$11.00 to \$12.00.

Locate Plane Forced Down in N. B. Woods

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Nov. 16 (CP)— Search had been conducted following reports that an aircraft was seen to fall in the area. A Mosquito bomber was reported missing from the R.C.A.F. base at Greenwood, N.S., but of- ficially made no statement concerning the incident.

The incident was an indirect cause of tragedy today when a car driven by R.M.C.F. Constable Mullin Hughes, proceeding to Black River to take part in the search, struck and killed seven-year-old Joseph Black at East Saint John. The boy was said to have run across the road in front of a car approaching the Constable's.
