

# Miners Beat Truro 7-5 To Win Maritime Title In Four Straight Games

GLACE BAY, N.S., March 16.—(CP)—Glace Bay Miners rolled to their first Maritime senior hockey championship tonight by defeating Truro Bearcats 7-5 to take their best-of-seven final series in straight games.

Miners, Cape Breton League title holders, succeeded to the crown last year by Sydney Millionaires of the same loop, who went right through to the Allan Cup final before they were stopped. The tri-province champions will meet the Quebec winners in the first round of the cup playoffs.

The highly-talented Bearcats from Nova Scotia's Antigonish-Pictou-Cochester circuit, managed to keep pace with Miners in the game's early stages and led 1-0 at the end of the opening period. But the Glace Bay power led in the second session as Miners rolled up four goals against Truro's one. Each team scored three in the last period.

Forwards Moe White and Pat Desbiens provided most of Miners' punch offensively, each getting a pair of goals. White rang up three assists while Desbiens, who scored in Miners' last 26 C.B.H.L. schedule games, helped out on two goals.

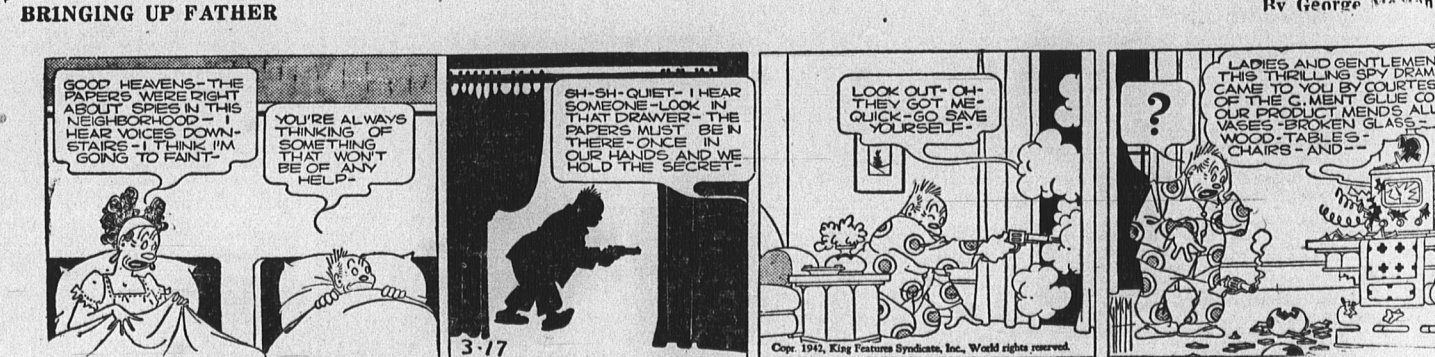
