THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., April 24—The expert trade in Canadian spring wheat with the United Kingdom and the continent was again reported exceedingly quiet today by Montreal exporters, but there was a steady demand for oats and sales of several loads were made for May-June shipment. A moderate amount of business was done in the domestic market on the further demand from exporters and sales of no. 3 northern wheat were made at 43-4 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg May option of Montreal, and a lot of 4000 bushels of Canadian western no. 1 feed oats sold at three cents per bushel over the May option of Montreal for shipment from Fort William. No. 2 feed oats sold at 79 cents per bushel of Montreal. There was also some further inquiry from New York exporters for oats in nearby positions. The trade in spring and winter wheat grades of flour was quiet, but prices were firm. A feature of the millfeed trade was again the demand of United States buyers and a good business was done in bran and shorts for prompt and nearby shipment to Boston at prices equivalent to \$41.50 per ton here. An active business was also done with local buyers and prices were unchanged. A firm feeling prevailed in the market for standard grades of rolled oats, but the demand was quiet. Demand for all grades of eggs was confined to small lots but the undertone to the market was firm. The receipts were 5,048 cases. The feature of the potato today was the weaker feeling that developed in market and prices receded a decline of ten to twenty cents per bag. This was attributed to the liberal receipts and the absence of any important demand. The market for imported beans was quiet but the undertone was firm. A firmer feeling prevailed in local butter trade and prices ruled a fraction higher under a good demand. The receipts were 608 packages. Little business was done in cheese but the undertone was steady. The receipts were 810 boxes.

EGGS

OTTAWA, April 24.—There is no change reported from Canadian egg markets today but the situation seems slightly firmer. TORONTO—The local market is unchanged but firm today. Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 28-30; firsts 27-28; seconds 22-23 delivered cases returned. Car lots are offered in Manitoba at extras 31; firsts 29 cents for freight 3 1/2 cents. MONTREAL—This market is unchanged in the prices. There is very strong demand for extras for storage. Firsts are steady while seconds are easier. SASKATOON—Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 25; firsts 23; seconds 18. Storage operations are going on in a small way. ST. JOHN—Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 25; firsts 25; seconds 20 cents delivered, cases returned. Receipts continue to show a steady increase.
