**THE MARKETS**

**HALIFAX MARKETS.**

Monday May 2.—Pork was very plentiful to say and small hogs were offered at 8 cents. The packers are now all filled up and demand is small. Nearly all the hogs now coming into this market are Nova Scotian.

Eggs have been exceedingly dull all week and were selling today at 15 cents by the case and in some sales this price was shaded a little. Dealers complain that there has been a very small demand this week for case eggs, owing to large quantities brought in and peddled out from waggons. Sales are reported in Montreal at 14 cents with consumptive demand good. Picklers in Ontario are beginning work and are said to be buying stock at 12 cents. They will have to reach that figure or lower on spot here before picklers can begin. There is a probability that a good many will be pickled this year as a result of the high prices prevailing this winter.

Cheese—The cheese market in the Upper Provinces is demoralized, owing to the large quantities of old make both here and in Great Britain. It is reported from London that stocks there are the largest in the history of the trade. April cheese is selling on spot in Ontario at 7 1/2 cents. Old cheese is quoted there at 8 to 8 1/2. Some new fadder cheese coming into this market is selling by the box at 10 to 10 1/2 cents.

Butter is very easy with no change in prices here. Good tub butter is 18 cents and rolls for which it is getting a little late, 17 cents.

Potatoes keep scarce and high. The P. E. I. schooners which were here all winter have all sold out their cargoes. Shipping to Boston has continued vigorously. Farmers should bear in mind in reading those quotations that the prices are on spot here and not at the point of purchase in the country. Potatoes quoted at 65 to 70 cents here would mean probably not more than 55 to 60 cents in the country. The expense of handling bags and so forth must be taken into consideration. The best quotations I can get today for potatoes bought at country points is 55 cents. It should also be borne in mind that new potatoes will be on the Boston market about the middle of May and prices are likely to take a sudden drop at almost any time. Turnips are scarcer still and are now about \$1 25 here. There are no other vegetables on the market.

**COUNTRY PRODUCE TORONTO.**

Toronto April 30. The following are today's prices here:

Butter—All lines continue to accumulate and prices are easy. The demand is light and only for the best kinds. Quotations are unchanged and the market has a easy tone.

Creamery, prints.....18 to 20c do solids.....17c to 17 1/2c Dairy, pound rolls, choice.....13c to 14c do large rolls.....13c to 14c poor to medium.....10c to 12c

A special London cable to The Montreal Trade Bulletin says:—The market is steady and with light stocks, holders are not as anxious to realize to induce business. Finest Canadian creamery 87s 80s.

Cheese—Arrivals of new cheese are fairly large, and they are quoted easier at 9c per lb. for large and 9 1/2c for twins. Old large is selling steady at 10c per lb.

A special London cable says:—The market is again weak and demoralized, and although holders have made a further concession the lower price does not help sales.

Eggs—There has been a sudden falling off in receipts and the market has stiffened up. About 14c to 14 1/2c are the ruling prices. The demand continues active.

Potatoes—American buyers are if this market, and as a consequence prices are 15c to 20c per bag higher. It is a long time since there have been any more potatoes coming forward than the demand could take care of, and further higher prices are likely if there is much more buying here by U. S. interests. Cars on

track here are quoted at \$1.05 to \$1.10, and out of store stock at \$1.15 to \$1.25. Seeds—The demand is a little quiete, fairly active, and out of store seeds are quoted steady.

Baled Hay—Is fairly steady at \$9 to \$9.50 per ton for car lots on track here. A special London cable says:—The market is steady with good Canadian inquired for at 67s 6d to 70s alongside.

Baled Straw—Car lots on track here are quoted unchanged at \$5 to \$5.50 per ton.

**DROWNED IN A CESSPOOL.**

DORCHESTER, N. B., May 1.—A shocking fatality occurred here yesterday. Three boys aged seven years were playing ball back of the Hotel Windsor. The ball went into a cesspool and Harold Orandall, in trying to recover it fell into the slimy waters and was drowned. His companions were so alarmed that they did not summon help at once, but when the accident was learned of it was too late to save the lad's life. The boy was the only son of Photographer Orandall of Moncton.

**YOUNG MAN'S SAD DEATH.**

FREDERICTON, May 1.—Fred McCoy, aged 21, son of John McCoy, horseman, died suddenly last night. He had been drinking heavily and some companions took him to a barn. 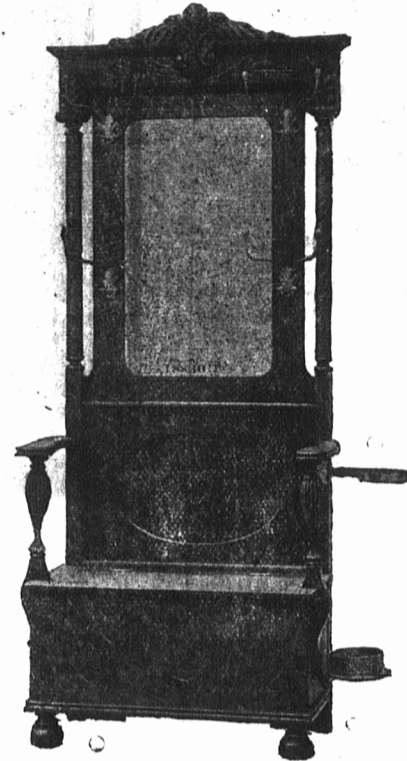
