IN MEMORIAM
MR. FINLAY MATHESON

On Thursday, September 4th, Mr. Finlay Matheson, a very highly esteemed resident of Darlington passed peacefully away at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm Cummins, at the age of 78 years.

The deceased had been in a somewhat poor condition of health for about six months, but very few, if any thought that his condition was serious.

Throughout his life, he had very seldom been ill and possessed of a strong constitution it was expected that he might yet, even at his age, have quite a number of years in which to enjoy the eventide of life, but evidently, such was not to be. It seemed impossible to find the secret of his declining weakness, for while still able to move about and suffering little or no pain, his strength gradually waned, until on the above mentioned date, his gentle spirit winged its homeward flight.

Mr. Matheson was twice married. The first Mrs. Matheson died about twenty years ago, and the second Mrs. Matheson passed away in August, 1929.

The deceased now leaves to mourn their loss of a kind and loving father, one son John Matheson, Glenside, Sask., and one daughter, Mrs. Percy J. Noy, Hunter River.

Mr. Matheson was one member of a large family of which only one brother now survives, viz: Mr. R. J. Matheson, Bellingham, Wash., U. S. A.

The deceased was a man who was well known throughout the whole countryside and was held in high esteem by all. For quite a number of years he drove the daily mail on each of two different routes. He thus became known to a great many and he was a man who was very popular with the public. He will be much missed by a large number of his old friends and associates. He was a loyal supporter of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and was ever ready to help on with every good cause. In carrying on his work in the world, he sought to make life pleasant for all with whom he came in contact.

He now rests from his labors, but his kind and thoughtful deeds and his words of good cheer will live long in the memory of those who came to know him.

When the end came, assured through faith in the great God and Father of all, that all was well, he passed away in peace like one "who wraps the drapery of his couch about him and lies down to pleasant dreams."

The funeral was a large one and was held on the afternoon of Saturday, September 6th. The service, which was an impressive one, was conducted by Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, assisted by Mr. R. J. Berlis, student catechist. The pall bearers were Messrs. Jos. H. McPherson, Dougald McPherson, Archibald McPherson, Eliph Howatt, Russell McLean and Malcolm McLeod. Interment was in the Brookfield Cemetery.

MALPEQUE

In Princetown United Church on Sunday morning the pastor, the Rev. E. M. Aitken addressed his hearers on the subject "Jesus call to deeper consecration," the text being Luke 5:4 "Launch out into the deep." In his introductory remarks, Mr. Aitken pointed out that Jesus had already begun his ministry and had won considerable popularity, but he saw

that he must break with the methods of His day and work with individuals. This scene portrays Him preaching on the shore of the Lake of Galilee. Turning away from the crowd to whom he had been preaching, he throws out the challenge to the brightest and most promising young man in the group, to Peter. As Peter fails to see its meaning, Jesus accompanies him out on the deep of the lake to illustrate what launching out into the deep of the Christian life really means. Jesus shows Peter the need of getting out into the deeps of life; so only as we expend and invest can we get returns. Though they discovered that the nets were breaking, that man's power is insufficient, yet coupled with God, great works can be accomplished. Peter had learned the lesson and when the challenge came again Peter obeyed. The same challenge comes to us, but there will be a lot of things we will have to sacrifice trivialities, bigotry, moroseness, selfishness and everything that is unchristlike before we, too, can launch out in the fuller service of the Christian life. The speaker at the evening service was the Rev. W. E. Aitken, B.A., of Richmond Bay East Charge. He took as his text the words of Jesus "I am come not to send peace but a sword." The speaker showed that the world's idea of Jesus as one who was meek and mild, too tender to be stern, too loving to be severe is not the conception that would be ours had we lived in the days of his flesh. Jesus was known to his own generation as an extremist; he saw there were many evils at which he had to strike and to strike hard. It was with that task before him that he said "I am come not to send peace but a sword." His goal was peace, but a price had to be paid before that peace could be established and that price was the cross.
