THE REVISED RATE FOLLOWING IS EFFECTIVE FROM DATE OF LAST METER READING AND WILL APPLY TO BILLS FOR MONTH OF JUNE, 1927.

POWER RATE

Applicable to consumers who can be served from suitable existing lines. No bill rendered on this rate of less than \$3.00 per month.

Service Charges:
On all connected load a Service Charge of 50 cents per month per Horse Power, will be made for the first 10 H. P. of connected load. When connected load exceeds 10 Horse Power that part of such load in excess of 10 Horse Power, will carry no Service Charge.

Energy Charge—(In addition to Service Charge.)
For the 1st 200 k. w. h. per month at 7c per k. w. h.
For the next 300 k. w. h. per month at 5c per k. w. h.
For the next 500 k. w. h. per month at 4c per k. w. h.
Excess of 1000 k. w. h. per month at 3c per k. w. h.

Discount—None.

Minimum Charge—(Effective for connected loads in excess of 10 H. P.)
In case the bill for any month computed on the service charge plus the energy rate is less than 50 cents per Horse Power of all connected load, then a Minimum Bill computed at 50 cents per Horse Power on all connected load, will be rendered.

Waiving of Minimum Charge:
The Minimum Charge will be waived for any three consecutive months in a year, upon the Company receiving written notice from the Consumer requesting that Minimum Charge be waived for three specified consecutive months.

Note—In case a Consumer desires service for intermittent use of small motors and such service would result in a monthly bill of less than \$3.00 computed at power rate, then such consumer may elect to be billed on the Lighting Rate, carrying a Service Charge of 50 cents per Horse Power of connected load.

TWENTY WOMEN VICTIMS OF HUMAN FIEND

Degenerate Known as the "Gorilla" Believed to be Hiding in Southern Part of Manitoba.

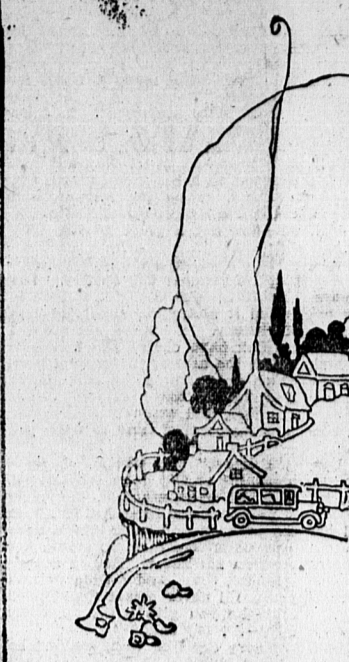
WINNIPEG, Man., June 13.—A contingent of United States Police officers who reached Winnipeg today from the annual chiefs convention in Windsor, Ontario, abandoned their program of entertainment to join Manitoba detectives in a province-wide search for the “hobo strangler” who murdered two Winnipeg women within a period of 48 hours and stuffed each body under a bed.

The slayer who is reported to be wanted in a score of cities across this border for similar crimes, is believed to be hiding somewhere in the southern part of the province and heading for the United States. Posses of police officers armed with sawed off shot guns, tear gas and rifles, were scouring the countryside today while the best brains of the police departments of several United States cities were concentrated upon the solution of the most brutal crime in the history of the province.

The United States police officers identified the degenerate killer as the “gorilla,” a swarthy fiend who has strangled to death more than 20 women and children in various parts of the United States. He was described as the most desperate murderer at large today and thousands of dollars have been offered for his capture dead or alive.

From San Francisco to Seattle and San Diego on the Pacific coast through Kansas city, Toledo, St. Louis and Chicago, a trail of horror has been left by the brute. Winnipeg first awakened to the fact on Friday night that the “hobo strangler” had extended his field of operations to these parts when Mrs. Emily Patterson, a mother of two children was discovered by her husband under a bed, the victim of strangulation.

In searching for the assassin responsible for this crime, the police yesterday unearthed a second ghastly slaying in a rooming house in the heart of the city's business district. The second victim was a 14 year old school girl, Lola Cowan, who had been missing from her home for four days.

A Famous "Crusader" On Dry Follies

“From Toronto Saturday Night.”
The growing sentiment against prohibition which is to be noted among the intelligent circles of all the leading United States cities, has received support from an unexpected quarter. Many men and women of middle age will recall the early “Crusaders against vice,” Rev. Dr. Parkhurst of New York, whose sensational campaign against “protected” vice and lawlessness attracted the attention in the early ‘nineties. His methods were drastic and he was much ridiculed, but he did do something

toward cleaning up the Bowery runs counter not only to human and the Tenderloin in the days of Tammany Hall was by no means the respectable institution that it is today. Many readers will be surprised to learn that Dr. Parkhurst is still alive and hearty at the age of 85 and a keen reader of the newspapers. It is years since his name appeared in the public prints, but not long ago a reporter of the “Herald-Tribune” managed to “dig out” the man who at the time he was Minister of Madison Square Presbyterian Church, was known as the “Militant and Good Citizen”. The old gentleman said that he could not feel that matters in New York had improved much since his day. Like many aged men he takes an exaggerated view of the “indecency of modern dress,” but he is tolerant enough to regard Fundamentalists as persons who make a fuss about nothing. He is on sound ground when he says that a city which possesses 25,000 speak-easies selling liquor in defiance of the law is not much better than the town of thirty-five years ago, whose dives he endeavoured to clean out. All authorities on New York's social history admit that by his own enthusiasm he considerably diminished police alliance with graft, and that the results of his good work lasted a quarter of a century. But with prohibition most of the evils he combated started to come back in greater force, and Dr. Parkhurst is not oblivious to this fact.

He says he was long the enemy of the saloon, but that he always sympathized with the “tavern spirit” which draws men to drink in each other's society, and of the pet hobby of some later crusaders he has this to say:
“Prohibition is an awful mess. The law is un-American, and its system of enforcement is corrupt and tyrannous.
“I am in general agreement with the Eighteenth Amendment, but not with the Volstead Act, it

don't know. Certainly it is having a bad effect. It injures the young, it corrupts the police and it is a prolific cause of dishonesty in public life.”
It is perhaps bringing coils to Newcastle to present Dr. Parkhurst's views to an audience of Canadian readers. In this country we are through with prohibition and its fallacies for a generation at least. But there is still a tendency in certain quarters to speak as though the prohibitionist were a holier and more upright person than the advocate of Government Control. It is for the benefit of those who regard the provinces of Canada as having a step of moral retrogression in getting rid of prohibition that we present the views of an old “crusader,” whose more courage is unassailable.
