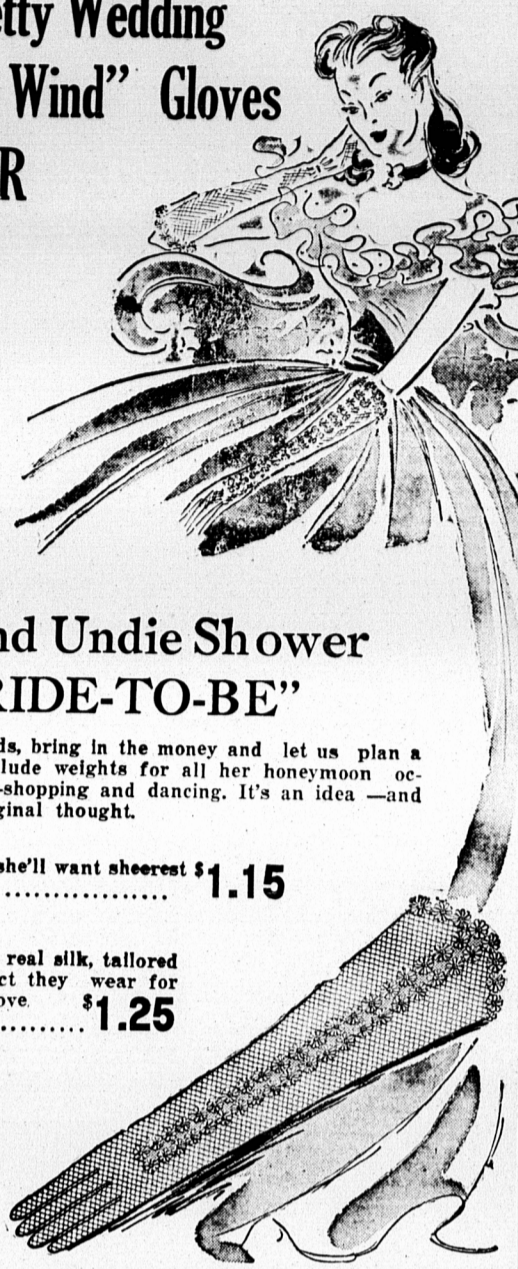

Local Offender Under Defence Act Dismissed

Charlottetown's first case of what appeared to be "fifth column" activity was dismissed at the Police Court yesterday morning. Gerald Lutes, a resident of this city charged with making statements contrary to the regulations of the Defence of Canada Act, was released but not without a withering dismissal from Stipendiary Magistrate K. M. Martin. The defendant made the rash statements over two weeks ago in a city barber shop before members of the fighting forces in uniform.

The Magistrate, in dismissing the charge, said: "It should be made clear that the evidence was fully established and in essentials admitted by you. It is sufficient to hold you in low regard. Your excuse of locular intent is established by the ridiculous untruth of your alarming statement as to your father's whereabouts and activity, against definite proof of his nationality, residence, and occupation."

"Your act has been at best one of offensive childishness and shows a little tendency to share in or recognize the universal feeling of strain of a people called to sacrifice in order to respect the uniform of the Service among your hearers."

"The result to you has been anxiety and discomfort likely to continue, and, if not corrected, will be unfortunate to your family connections. Between untimely and unhumorous laces and ill-natured overbear persons dependent on your patronage you would do well to guard your tongue until you mature in sense and decency."

Veterans Home Guard Company

For the information of ex-servicemen desiring to join the Veterans Home Guard Company that is being raised in Military District No. 6, it is notified that every applicant should communicate with his own Branch of this organization. The arrangements made with the Presidents of the Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island Commands of the Canadian Legion, British Empire Loyal League, and other branches will record the names of any applicants, and that their names will be submitted to the District Recruiting Officer, Halifax, in accordance with a scheme of proportional representation between Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Upon receipt of these names, the applicants, if under the age of 50 years, will be medically examined at convenient centres under arrangements to be made by the District Medical Officer. The Branch Recruiting Office at Charlottetown is conforming.

3. The order of selection decided upon by Defense Headquarters, Ottawa, is: (a) Those who served in a theatre of war. (b) Those who served in the United Kingdom. (c) Those who served in Canada.

Fleet Air Arm Does Good Work. LONDON, May 31.—(OP)—Plans of the fleet air arm, attacking German communications along the Belgian coast, were credited by the Air Ministry tonight with numerous direct hits on troop concentrations, motorized units and a large open touring car escorted by two motorcycle outriders. An Air Ministry bulletin said the fleet air arm—which is separated from the Royal Air Force—operating with the coastal command directed its attack on Germans bringing up troops and ammunition trucks along the Nieuport road along the Belgian coast. Nieuport is south of Ostend.
