A very pleasant time took place at the Ross Hotel, Mt. Stewart last Friday evening when the session and board of Trustees of the Presbyterian congregation met with the pastor Dr. McPhail. The Rev. John Hawley of Marshfield the recent moderator of the session was invited, and was presented on behalf of the congregation with a token to the amount of \$35.00. Isaac Jay (elder) presented the gift and gave speech to a few well spoken words thanking Mr. Hawley for his careful oversight while they were pastorless, making special reference to the hearty call which he took great interest in, to Dr. McPhail, who was now with them, and who was being held in high esteem and in view of all said Mr. Hawley ought to receive great praise. Friday night in Beethoven Hall three very talented students graduated in piano, singing and oratory. Miss Doratha E. Huestis played an excellent and difficult program with great credit. The Chopin numbers (Ballade in A-flat and Impromptu) were thoroughly enjoyed, also the Appassionata Sonata of Beethoven. Miss Myrtle Atkinson, whose rich contralto voice delighted everyone, sang two songs in German and two dainty pieces, one by Nevin and an old Song by Purcell "Nymphs and Shepherds," also "Abide with Me" by Liddle. Miss Hazel Hughes, Charlottetown, the Oratory Student, was most successful in her numbers and reflected the greatest credit upon her teacher Miss Mitchell. The last number "Sombre" was generally acknowledged as the best on her program. In this number she displayed wonderful voice development and excellent dramatic power. Miss Hughes is especially talented and is one of the most gifted and brilliant young ladies that Mount Allison has ever graduated. Last evening's program completed the series of graduating recitals which have been held during the past two months. This recital was probably the best artistically and numerically of this series.

Of those of one hundred and fifty dollars open to first year men new in the graduate school one in mathematics was awarded to L. Dickson of Sackville, New Brunswick, a graduate of Mount Allison.
