No Hope Of British Market For Potatoes

Members of the Charlottetown Board of Trade yesterday learned there was no hope of having the British market opened for early Canadian potatoes in season. A committee was named at a quarterly meeting of the Board on Wednesday to investigate the possibility of having the British embargo removed.

Yesterday the committee learned the matter had been brought to the attention of James A. MacKinnon, Commissioner, London by the Provincial Potato Growers Association earlier this summer. There was every possibility of a surplus of potatoes in Britain this year, despite the cutting off of supplies from the continent. Senator John E. Sinclair, who conducted negotiations for the Potato Growers' Association, was informed, a greatly increased acreage was planted in tubers in Britain this year, the Senator learned.

The fruit trade commissioner of London stated: "I have to inform you that there is no prospect of the government removing the existing embargo on moving the existing potatoes. There is every prospect of there being a surplus of potatoes in this country and plus of potatoes for the importation does not exist."

WINNIPEG, Oct. 10.—(CP)—An announcement was made here today of the retirement, effective Nov. 30, of S. L. Dr. Legate's Tribute

Following is the text of Dr. Legate's funeral sermon: "We meet in God's house today under the shadow of a great sorrow, a sorrow all the heavier to bear, because it has broken upon us so unexpectedly. And this congregation, large as it is, is but a fraction of a widespread circle of mourners who know themselves to have undergone a severe loss.

"I am quite aware that I am addressing men and women who have known our departed friend for a very much longer period than I myself have. But in the tribute which I am here to pay to his memory, I want you to consider me as one of yourselves, and to allow me to try and be the mouthpiece of what you and I and all of us feel in this hour.

"I first came under the spell of his winning personality in his own church in New York a good many years ago. It was an Easter Day, and he stirred the hearts of his crowded congregation with an unforgettable rendition of the great doctrine of the Resurrection.

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Price For Table Potatoes Drops 5 Cents

A good average crop of Green Mountains is expected in the province this year. It was learned last night. Farmers have started digging this variety recently.

Meanwhile the movement on cobbles continues slowly with the table stock bringing 25 cents a bushel. Prospects were not very bright for markets a month ago, and the situation has not been bettered. Four starch factories in the province have been opened recently and are buying the tubers.

The estimate for the crop yield in United States which was released Oct. 1, was 6,000,000 higher than it was last month. Growers in the country will have a yield of 389,000,000 bushels this year according to the estimate. This is considerably higher than last year's crop. There are 100 acres of the E. S. Triumph variety grown in the province.

Turks Fear Squeeze Play

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Turkish newspapers expressed nervousness tonight over a German military move in Anatolia, and voiced a hope that Russia would assert its own policy in the Balkans. Turkish anxiety was also voiced.
