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Gov. Carvell at Rest

Requiem and Burial Service With Masonic Honors.

The funeral of the late Governor took place yesterday afternoon. The remains of the deceased were removed to St. Peter's Cathedral at 9 a. m., the bearers of the casket being Messrs. F. P. and Harrison Carvell; F. S. Hanford and W. H. Barr; John A. and Frank Messervey. The Requiem Mass was then said. At 3 the funeral service began, every available seat and all available space in the building being occupied before the ceremonies began. All the prominent people of the city were present in the Cathedral. At the front near the bier were the pall bearers, and the relatives and friends. The casket, which was an elegant one, stood on a frame at the front bearing on its several beautiful floral tributes. The service was solemn and impressive. It occupied about three quarters of an hour. About four o'clock the funeral procession left the Cathedral in the following order:

Officers of Militia. Police. City Council. Mayor. Masons. Friends. Undertaker.

Junior Pallbearers. Mr. T. O. James, Mr. John Messervey, Mr. T. J. Harris, Mr. D. O'M. Riddin, Mr. Percy Pope, Mr. F. H. Arnold, Senior Pallbearers. F. de St. C. Brecken, R. R. Fitzgerald, Q. C. Mr. Justice Hodgson, Senator McDonald, Mr. W. H. Atkin, Malcolm McLeod, Q. C.

Hearse. Family. Government. Friends.

The procession moved off to the west as the remains came from the Church. The Militia, Police, Council, Mayor and Masons being formed in readiness on R-chford Street, facing south, the procession took the following order:

Priest. Undertaker. Pallbearers. Hearse. Family.

Among the gentlemen in the procession were noticed Messrs Alexander H. Hume, A. N. Lurge, S. W. Orabbe, John Ollinga, John Ross, John F. Carr, Harry W. H. John J. Davis, R. Besinger, L. H. Davies, W. A. O. Morson, F. Smith (Summerfield), Arthur Sanders, B. Bremner, J. S. Rymond, Stephen Moore, D. Small, Sidney G. G. J. P. P. Walter Matheson, Judge Hensley, F. H. Beer and many more.

Those who were drawn up broke ranks and proceeded, passing the hearse and family, right and left of the hearse, along B-chford Street, turning up Kent Street; the procession continuing along as the Masons closed. Then the family, next the members of the Government came, followed by friends.

As the casket was being removed from the church, a salute of guns to the number of fifteen, was fired from Fort Edward. The funeral cortege took its way out of the city with bells tolling and flags on a great number of buildings at half mast to signalize the last solemn ceremonies.

On every street corner immense crowds were gathered to view the funeral procession, who kept the best of order, evincing their respect and interest as it passed. When the procession left the city proper, a number of those following is dropped off, but a very large crowd followed to the cemetery. Arrived there the burial service was read, besides which a Masonic Service took place that was exceedingly beautiful and appropriate.

The piercing air of the February afternoon was a great drawback to the comfort of those who went out to view the last ceremonies and cold also prevented many from going out. The procession, however, was said to be one of the largest ever seen in this city and none ever included so many of the prominent men of Charlottetown present to pay their last tribute of respect to the dead.
