THE VERY LATEST THAT SCIENTISTS ARE ENDEAVORING TO PROVE

A Regular Fairy Story of Science—How the Wheat Supply of the World Is to Be Increased—Wheat to be Fed By the Air

LONDON, Eng., Feb. 11.—"Living on air" has for a long time been regarded as an equivalent to starvation, but the phrase takes on a new meaning in the light of a startling scientific discovery recently announced by the Daily Chronicle. Research work by Sir William Crookes, the famous chemist, is largely responsible for the notable achievement, which consists of a process for extracting nitric acid from the atmosphere in such a way as to make it available for industrial and agricultural purposes.

Just how this will solve the problem of the world's food supply is not immediately clear to the unscientific mind. Yet this is the claim made for the discovery. Sir William Crookes pointed out, in his presidential address before the British Association in 1888, that the tendency of the earth's population is to outstrip the production of wheat—in short, that the demand is on the way to exceeding the supply. As the people of most nations are bread-eaters, this is an alarming situation, for making every allowance for possible increase in the area under wheat cultivation, mankind is threatened with starvation at no distant period. Only one thing can avert such a fearful calamity—the laboratory must come to the service of man, and increase the fertility of the land, so that it may supply our needs.

SAVING THE WHEATFIELDS. Wheat is a crop demanding a large supply of nitrogen, in the form of nitric acid, and at present this is afforded by the nitrate beds of South America. But before many years these beds will be exhausted, and the problem that has faced the scientist is how to tap another source for this indispensable fertilizer of the world's wheatfields. To get this in large quantities would solve the difficulty of raising enough wheat.

As long ago as 1892 Sir William Crookes had proved that nitric acid could be obtained from the atmosphere, and experiments were not on foot to discover a method of obtaining it at a cheap rate. For six years experiments have been going forward at Fibrous, and Sir William Crookes has been kept constantly informed of their progress. Recently he paid a visit to the scene of operations, and the Daily Chronicle understands that at last, in large quantities, at a cheap rate, is an accomplished fact. To quote Sir William Crookes, this may lead to the development of a mighty industry destined to solve the great food problem.

Widespread interest has been aroused in the Daily Chronicle's announcement, and several of the leading scientists of Germany, who spoke to the Berlin correspondent of that paper on the subject regard it as of the greatest importance.

Prof. Fischer, head of the Royal Chemical Laboratory in Berlin, regards the matter as of vital importance, and is likely to solve a problem which has been occupying the attention of scientists for a long time.

The head of the laboratory of the German Royal Agricultural College was also deeply interested. He considered the matter of incalculable value from the agriculturist's point of view, and stated that if Sir William Crookes has proved successful his discovery will be a blessing to the farmer, and will mark an epoch in scientific annals.

A BIG EXPLOSION AT WOOLWICH, ENG.

WOOLWICH, Eng., Feb. 11.—A huge hole in the ground wall that marks the site of the Woolwich Arsenal and the Cordite Magazine, which exploded early this morning with such terrific force that the concussion was felt in towns forty miles away, and the whole countryside was thrown into a panic, owing to the belief that a violent earthquake had occurred. There was no loss of life, but buildings for miles around were wrecked to a greater or less degree by the explosion. These buildings were practically swept away, the big blocks of stone of which they were constructed being scattered for hundreds of yards on all sides. Yesterday being Sunday there was no night shift working, hence the absence of casualties. The people of Deal, some forty miles away, were thrown into a panic by the shock of the explosion.
