In the early dawn before most of the city is awake, Hamilton's Central Market is a hive of industry that rivals the Fulton Fish Market in New York, in all except its smell. For whereas both are the largest of their kind on the continent, Hamilton's market gives out a pleasant odor of farm produce, flowers, vegetables, fruits and meats. Here, behind the towering pile of the City Hall, is a big source of revenue for 1,686 growers with produce from 100,847 acres. Although no one has ever been able to make an accurate estimate of the revenue turned over annually at the Central Market, a conservative guess sets it at \$5,000,000.

This revenue represents the return during nine months of the year from April to December only. During January, February and March the market consists mainly of transient producers.

The market is conducted jointly for the benefit of the farmers of the district.
