Ten new and one renewal subscriptions have been sent to the United Churchman. During the month twenty one cards and letters were sent to the sick, and eleven sick calls made.

An interesting program consisted of a Reading by Mrs. J. M. Campbell and a Chapter from the Study Book by Mrs. Ray MacLeod. The collection amounted to \$315. "Risen" was chosen for the text word for the Easter meeting and Mrs. C. B. Goss is to be the leader. Mrs. Leigh Brown, Mrs. F. Brown and Mrs. J. M. Campbell are the Program Committee. Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Kensington Dairying Co-operative Association Limited was held in the King George Hall, Kensington, Tuesday, March 16, 1948 over one hundred and fifty shareholders being present. The President, Louis O'Connor presided. The following is the President's report.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

To the Shareholders and Patrons of the Kensington Dairying Co-operative Association Limited in Annual Meeting held in King George Hall, Kensington, Tuesday, March 16, 1948 at 2 p.m.

Gentlemen: This, being the third Annual Meeting of our Dairying Co-operative I wish to extend a sincere welcome to all present here to-day.

I am pleased to report, that despite another dry season, this has been the most successful year that we have had. Our total volume of business has been a little over 284,000.00 — An increase of \$32,000.00 over last year. Our butter-maker, Mr. Cyril Connick and his assistant, have turned in the best year's work with regard to the making of butter — that we have ever had. I think that Mr. MacDonald — The Dairy Superintendent will bear me out in this; and I would also like to say here, that our Manager, Mr. W. I. Delaney and his bookkeeper, Mr. Bruce Howard have done exceptionally good work too.

When Mr. Delaney took charge in 1934, the volume of business for that year was 64,000 lbs. of butter manufactured, worth \$13,552.00. This time three years ago, we were operating in the old factory. You all know, at the present time, what property we own, which is all free of debt. A great deal of the credit for this change is due, to the integrity and whole-hearted interest of our Manager.

My report, at the last Annual Meeting, showed the number of shares held was 1251½, valued at \$12,515.00. Col. Johnstone was appointed Campaign Chairman at that meeting to make a drive to complete our organization, and raise sufficient share capital to finance the business. The result of that drive, as reported at our Special Meeting, held September 26 last — was 334½ shares, valued at \$3,345. At our Annual Meeting one year ago, our only debt on the property, was \$4000.00 plus interest of \$160.00 on the Champion Mortgage. We applied the above \$3,345.00 to pay off that amount. The balance was made up by additional Share Capital, subscribed at our Special Meeting here-capital to date amounts to \$7,039.00 which includes the 500.00 subscribed in 1933. The number of patrons sending cream last year was 527 — 321 of those are shareholders and 206 are not. If those 206 would become members that would complete our organization.

After taking out Depreciation for Buildings, Machinery and Office equipment, also 10% of our profits amounting to \$541.50 for Reserve fund, 5% of our profits amounting to \$270.75 for Educational Fund, also 5% Dividend on Share Capital, amounting to \$830.00, we have a net profit to be re-bated to our members and patrons of \$4602.80. Your Board of Directors desire and urge that all interested take their individual rebates in Stock Bonus. By so doing those 206 patrons would become members and then our organization would be completed, and it would also relieve your Board of Directors of that much personal responsibility. By building up Capital Stock in this way funds would be created for expansion. We expect some action to be taken at this meeting in this regard. After due consideration and discussion by the Directors, Manager and Buttermaker, we strongly advocate that a new creamery with cold storage be built on the lot by the Railway. With this object in view, we had Mr. Henry Macdonald and Mr. T. W. Cope meet with us on two different occasions, to try to work out a plan suitable to our situation and needs, so that we could give this meeting an estimate of what it would cost. The limited space that we have for cold storage, at the present time, is neither sufficient nor suitable and it is a problem that has to be dealt with in the near future. If we continue to operate, as a Co-operative, the factory and warehouse should be situated together. Should this business pass into the hands of private ownership, this matter would soon be attended to. The question to be considered here to-day is — how soon are we going to start? and how is it going to be financed?

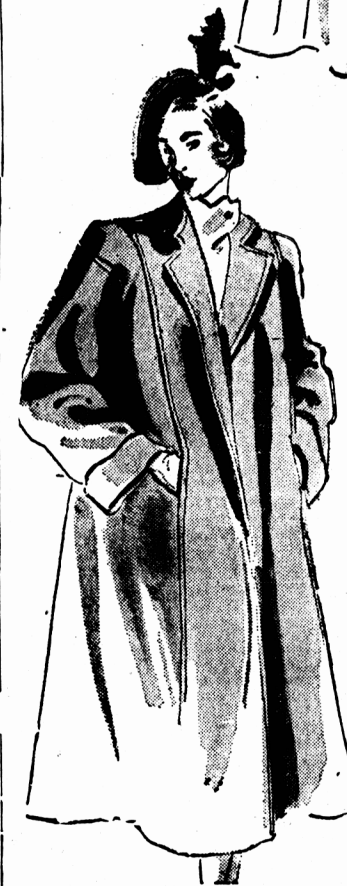

The Financial and Auditor's reports were then presented. There was a surplus of \$4602.80 to be divided between the patrons and shareholders and it was decided at the meeting that this amount would be taken out in shares so as to leave this amount in the business as working capital.
The following were elected to the Board of Directors, Ellis Profitt, Heath Mayhew and Frank Ramsay in place of the three retiring directors, Turner Glydon, Robert Hogg and John A. Johnson. The Board of Directors is as follows: Louis O'Connor, President; Murdoch McLeod, Vice-President; James W. Cousins, Clarence Hazlam, Lloyd Lockery, Heath Mayhew, Ellis Profitt, Frank Ramsay and Charles Taylor.
The need of a new plant with mechanical refrigeration was discussed at some length. Mr. T. W. Cope gave an outline of the proposed building. As the hour was getting late, this matter was left over for the time being.

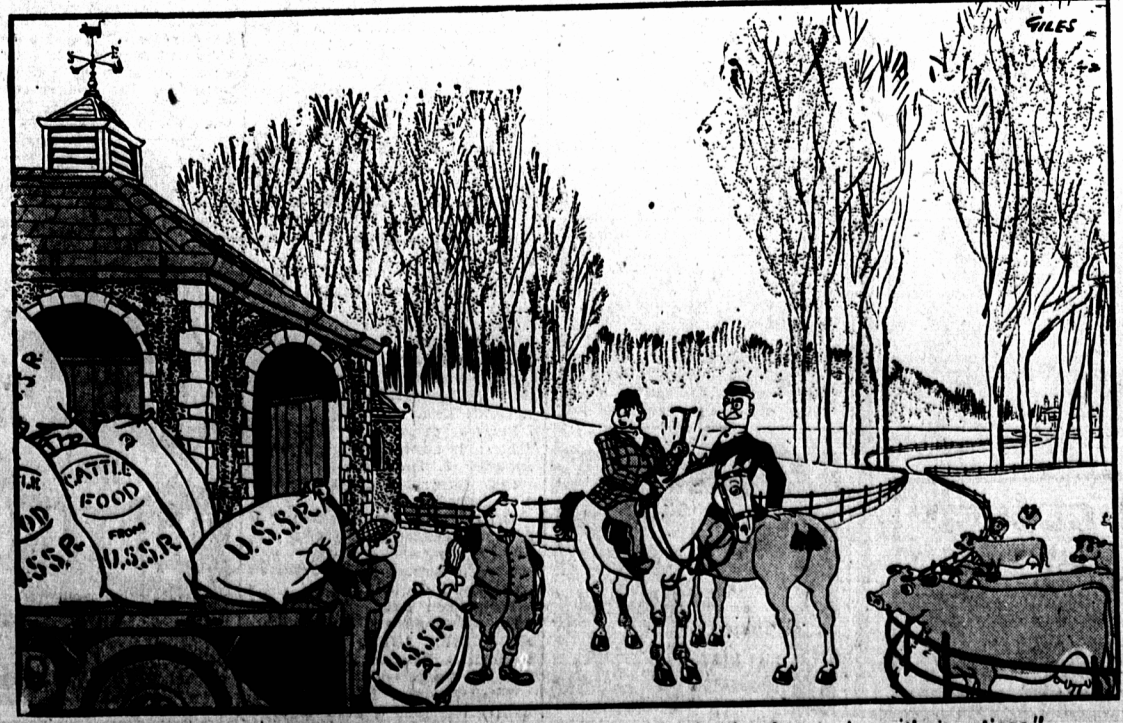
