The Death Of Mr. John K. McKenzie

The death of Mr. John K. McKenzie which occurred yesterday at his home on School Street will be learned with regret by his wide circle of friends both in the City and throughout the Province.

Born 65 years ago at Wheatley River, the son of the late Mr. Donald McKenzie, Mr. McKenzie removed at an early age to Charlottetown where he apprenticed to the printing trade, which trade he followed to within a week of his death. For many years he was employed in the office of Hazard and Moore, and was subsequently manager of the printing office of the Maritime Stationers. About eleven years ago he went to the Irwin Printing Company where he has been employed since that time.

Recognized for his discriminating literary taste, Mr. McKenzie was the writer of a number of poems and historical sketches of considerable merit.

Mr. McKenzie was for many years a member of the Caledonian Club of which he was Chief at the time of his death. Last year he was president of that organization. He was also a member of the Canadian Order of Foresters.

Mr. McKenzie is survived by his wife, by one son, Herbert, and by one daughter, Nora. He is also survived by two brothers, Donald, St. John, N. B., and Arthur, City, and by a half sister, Mrs. W. W. McLaren, Georgetown, to all of whom The Guardian extends sincere sympathy.
