HOW GREAT BRITAIN CAME TO RECOGNIZE HUERTA.

LONDON, Aug. 11.—The British government, nettled by the comment of certain American papers concerning Great Britain's recognition of President Huerta, declares that the comment is based on a misconception of facts. It also repudiates the insinuation that the influence of powerful financial interests were used in hastening about recognition.

FRENCH GOVERNMENT HAS NEW INVENTION

PARIS, Aug. 12 (Special)—It is stated that the French government is watching a series of extraordinary experiments at Havre with an invention of a man named Ulivi, who is said to have discovered means for projecting ultra-violet rays a distance of fourteen miles and exploding gunpowder contained in a metallic box.
